A reserve located about 8km SE of Mount Boss and about 10km S by SE of Mount Banda Banda within Mount Boss State Forest.

ABC Farm

Camden Haven. Farm on the Kew Road, opposite Lakewood Village.

Abotsmith

Mountain Range, N.W. of Mt. Boss. In Rollands Plains district.

Absalom Reserve
Gazetted: 25 Feb 1994

A reserve with frontages to Livingstone St, Beechtree Crt, and Parsons Ridge Rd. Origin: The name Absalom Reserve was chosen to commemorate the Absalom family who owned the land from 1893 until fragmented by residential subdivision, a period of nearly 100 years.

Ackroyd Street

Port Macquarie. Robert Ackroyd was a Commissariat officer in the early penal settlement. He was placed in charge of all military and convict buildings and, in the early 1830s, bought a property on the Hastings River opposite Hardys Plains (in Pappinbarra Parish).

Adelaide Brook

Small creek, emanating in Ballengarra Forest, running through Dondingalong to the Macleay River.

Adeline Street

North Haven. Named after Alfred Eames's wife Adeline.

Afton Waters

Farm on the north side of the Oxley Highway, 20km west of Wauchope and about 6km west of Gannons Creek, on the south side of the Hastings River.

Alanvale

Farm on Upper Pipers Creek (Marlo Merrican).

Albert

Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969

A parish lands administrative division.

Albert

Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973

A trig. station about 5km WSW of Hollisdale locality and about 6km NW by N of Bagnoo. TS6141.

Albert Street

Kendall. Two possible origins: Albert Rose, a former Councillor; or, Albert George Smith, a famed bricklayer of Batar Creek Road. (Source: Kew Information Centre officer Blair Montague-Drake n.d.). See also The Early Dwellings and Residents 1860-1960 Kendall.

Alcheringa

Property 3km south east of Byabarra, on Jones Road.

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| Alf Trotter Reserve Gazetted: 9 Jan 2015 | A reserve situated in River Street Wauchope encompassing the Rex Clark Memorial Complex. Alf 'Smacka' Trotter was the longest serving President of the Wauchope Timbertown Tennis Club for approx 30 years. |
| Alfred Street | North Haven. Named after Alfred Eames. |
| Algona Road | Middle Brother. Runs west off Pacific Highway, W of Watson Taylor Lake. |
| Allambie Place | Port Macquarie. Believed to be an Aboriginal word but meaning unknown. |
| Allan Johnson Close | Sancrox. Named after George Allan Johnson, 1845-1901, who established twin sawmills at Sancrox. Much of the timber from the mills was shipped to Sydney and provided wooden paving blocks for Sydney streets. |
| Allan Road | Wauchope. Allan Bain was a local landholder. |
| Allendale | (1) Property of Robert McKay at Rollands Plains, (see PMN, 6 Apr 1889). This property was subdivided in later years and a lower portion retained the name Allendale. (see Estate Names - Port Macquarie and Hastings Region. (Dawson 2014). (2) Property of Mr & Mrs G.T. Allan at Comboyne (see PMN, 12 Nov 1938, p.4). (3) House of Mr & Mrs Mackay at east Kempsey (see PMN, 18 Aug 1948, p.4). N.B. Also the name of several other properties in the Manning district. (4) Property at Wilson River, belonging to William Parker. |
| Allans Well | Charles Dick's property 3km W of Port Macquarie (see PMN, 7 Apr 1917, p.4). Near the racecourse. |
| Allen Hill Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973 | A hill at Telegraph Point about 5km SW by S of Cooperabung Hill and about 2km W of Dalhunny Island. Previous name Mount Allen. |
| Allendale | See Allendale. |
| Allman Hill Gazetted: 5 Nov 1993 | A hill within the reserve at the corner of Clarence Street and Grant Street, Port Macquarie. Captain Francis Allman was the First Commandant at Port Macquarie Penal Settlement who arrived on 17 April 1821. Also referred to as Gaol Hill or Tombstone Hill. |
| Allman Street | Port Macquarie. Named after Captain Francis Allman, 48 th Regiment, and the first Commandant at Port Macquarie 1821-1824. |

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| Allmans Plains | The shoreline from the point of Settlement Point to the Hibbard ferry was named Allmans Plains by Governor Macquarie while rowing up the river with Captain Allman in 1823. He noted that the area seemed suited for the settlement's agricultural gardens. When this land was opened to settlers in 1845 Dr. William Bell Carlyle bought the area and grew grapes, naming the estate 'Hamilton'. |
| Alloe Vale | J.Suter's land, Wauchope (see PMN, 1 Dec 1917). |
| Alma Street. | (1) North Haven. Named after Alma Eames, daughter of Alfred Eames. (2) Wauchope. Possibly named after Thomas Wallace's niece Alma, or a cottage in Cornwall, England, Alma Cottage, that was associated with the family of Thomas Wallace's wife, Mary Randle Webb. |
| Alva | On the Hastings River, Waugh Street Port Macquarie (see PMN, 4 Aug 1938, p.10). |
| Alvington | Property of Thomas Warlter at Ennis, Aug 1889, 1906. |
| Amaroo | Port Macquarie. Station 2km SE of Rollands Plains, W of Rollands Plains Road. |
| Amelia | Farm on the southern shore of Queen's Lake, E of Lakewood Village. |
| Andrews Falls | Upper Hastings River. |
| Andrews Park Gazetted: 20 May 1988 | Reserve for public recreation located in Cameron Street, Wauchope, about 500 metres south of Wauchope Railway Station. Origin: Named after Councillor Joseph R. Andrews who was President of Hastings Shire Council from 1965 to 1969, in recognition of his efforts in arranging grants for the drainage and reclamation of the park. Andrews Park provides an area of open space to cater for both recreational and sporting activities. A shady corner garden offers a pleasant rest area for travellers and locals. The area was previously a dam. |
| Angle Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969 | A non-perennial stream rising about 3.5km SSE of Yarras Trig Station. It flows generally NE then SSE for about 6km into the Ellenborough River about 2.5km ENE of Doyles River Junction. |
| Angle run | George Johnson's cattle station on the Ellenborough River. |
| Annie Ville | O. C. Och's house, Hay St. (see PMN, 31 Jan 1925). Home built for O.C. Och, Hay St. after the family left "Grantham". Mr W.R. West's house, Hay St. opposite Mrs Egan, Port Macquarie - 10 Mar 1923 |

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| Apanie Road | Lake Innes. West of the Pacific Highway and Lake Innes. |
| Apple Tree Mountain Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987 | A mountain rising about 331m from Cowal Creek, about 7km W by S of Bellangry and about 16km W by S of Ballengarra. |
| Appletree Camp | Carey's property above Yarras. |
| Appletree Flat | Farm off Jones Creek Road, 3km south of Ellenborough. *On the right bank of the Wilson River, Telegraph Point. (see PMN, 6 Feb 1889). T.H.C. Blewitt near there on 1869-70 electoral roll. |
| Aqua Reserve Gazetted: 28 Aug 1992 | A reserve located between the southern bank of Lake Cathie and Aqua Crescent. |
| Araluen | Station on the Bellangry Road, 1km west of Bellangry. |
| Araluen Street | Kendall. The street was named after the daughter of Henry and Charlotte Kendall. (Source: The Early Dwellings and Residents 1860-1960 Kendall) |
| Argents Hill | In the Lake Innes property, named after the Argent family. |
| Arizona | Farm off Jones Creek Road, 6km south of Ellenborough, off Thone Creek Road. |
| Arncliffe | House and land, 23 acres, 3 roods, 4 perches fronting Lovers Walk (off Pacific Drive), Port Macquarie. Built by John Lowry Ruthven about 1883. Had 13 rooms, hall, and verandah 10 feet wide, with 6 room kitchen at the back. (see PMN, 22 Jul 1893). Home of Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Wright, School Inspector, 8 Apr 1899. |
| Arncliffe Avenue | Port Macquarie. Named after the house 'Arncliffe' which was situated on John Lowry Ruthven's property (near Hill Street up towards the ocean) which encompassed this road. The Avenue was named sometime after WW2. 'Arncliffe' was referred to in a marriage record in 1856. Later in 1883 Ruthven built a new house with 13 rooms. During the 1930s the new house was used as a guesthouse. |
| Arndale | Farm west of North Coast Railway line, 5km north of Herons Creek. |
| Arnott Street | Laurieton. Named after Colin Arnott, drogher captain, and well-known early settler who died in 1948. |
| Arstocrat | Station between Rollands Plains Road and the Wilson River, Ballengarra. |

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| Arthurs Park Gazetted: 14 Jan 1999 | A reserve located off Seamist Place, Port Macquarie. Origin: Arthur Ernest Ellis (14.04.1929 - 12.05.1997) a former police sergeant retired to Port Macquarie where he won two awards for bravery. He loved the area and cleared the neighbouring property of lantana and made it into a public walkway. (Ellis, R., brother, naming proposal 23 November 1998). |
| Ashburn Hill | Hill in Port Macquarie in vicinity of present Gordon Street/Ocean Drive intersection. In the early days of settlement gangs of up to 100 men would burn logs here to create ash to be used for soap making. In early reports it was known as <i>Ashburners Hill</i> . The Maher family later lived on a property built there. |
| Ashton | Ad: - 20 acres for sale, vineyard and slaughter house to let (see PMN, Dec 1888). Ad: "- Property known as Ashton, near port Macquarie, containing about 40 acres, with good dwelling house, vineyard, slaughter house etc. Apply G. Bransdon (auctioneer)". |
| Ashton Hill | Name used by Nancy Davidson and Gilbert Mant to describe the hill from which stone was quarried to build the southern break wall. " <i>The stone came from quarries along the Kempsey Road (Hastings River Drive). Ashton's Hill was one of main sources</i> " (see Nancy Davidson PMN, Dec 27 1990). See also (alternatively cited as) Aston Hill. |
| Ashtons Hill | See Ashton Hill. |
| Aston | On the Kempsey Road (now Hastings River Drive), owned by H. Williams, solicitor. Sugar mill, at Aston, owned by Lord Somerville, now Davis (his partner, to whom he bequeathed it). |
| Aston Estate | Derived from Lord Somerville's estate in the UK. Owned Aston Estate in Port Macquarie and the sugar mill there in the 1870s. When he died he was buried at Somerville Aston (see Manning River Times 10 Dec 1870) the funeral left Aston House. |
| Aston Hill | A hill in West Port Macquarie, once the site of the quarry for metal for the southern break wall, 1897-99. (see History of Port Macquarie p133) Owned by R. MacDuff 1910. See also (alternatively cited as) Ashton Hill. |
| Aston Vale | Once owned by John Bourne. |
| Astronomers Hill | See Transit Hill. |
| Astronomers Terrace | Transit Hill Port Macquarie. See Transit Hill. |

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| Athol Brae | Property of W. Lindsay, Huntingdon 1907, 1910. Property of G. C. Lindsay, Huntingdon 1911 (see PMN, 28 Jan 1911). |
| Auburn Cottage | Home of H. Windeyer-12 acres, house of 6 rooms, enclosed land, outhouses and pure permanent water-to let (see PMN, 7 Jan 1901). Mrs. Dennis' home, Port Macquarie. |
| Avelon | Property 1km north of Ballengarra, on the eastern side of the Rollands Plains Road at Herbert's Road turn-off. |
| Avenel | Property 4km S.E. of Ballengarra on the north bank of the Wilson River, towards Telegraph Point. |
| Avondale | Farm, upper Pappinbarra Creek area. One time the property of William Hastings Blythe, Pappinbarra. |
| Avondale Street | Wauchope. Street boarded by Bain Park and Catholic Primary School, running west off Range Street. |
