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- Jabiru Reserve**
Gazetted: 28 Aug 1992
A reserve located between the northern bank of Lake Cathie and Evans Street at Lake Cathie. Origin: Jabirus (Black Necked Storks) are regularly seen fishing and wading at this reserve.
- Jabuk Close**
Port Macquarie. From the Aboriginal word for "bullock team."
- Jacaranda House**
Historic building in Cameron Street, Wauchope built in the 1888 for the Australian Joint Stock Bank. Then Leased (about 1910) and later purchased by the Commerical Banking Company. Various owners including N. J. Lindsay and in 1977 Neils Brown.
- Jackes 40 Acres**
"Jackes' 40 acres, on the New England road, will be auctioned by Mr Bridson to-day at his rooms, Port Macquarie." (see PMN, 9th March 1912 p.4) *see also 'Oakleigh'*
- Jackson Street**
Kendall. Naming uncertain. Probably named for Mr John Jackson, of Old Lorne Road, Black Creek, who was an old time resident of Kendall and regularly donated to the Manning District Hospital. Death July 1934. (see PMN, 14 July 1934, p.5), See also (Source: The Early Dwellings and Residents 1860-1960 Kendall)
- Jackys Creek**
Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969
A non-perennial stream rising about 1.2km W of Sugarloaf Mountain. It flows generally NW for about 3.6km into the Ellenborough River. Previous name Bulga or Jacky's Creek.
- Jamberoo**
In the Yarrowitch area - N of Brassy State Forest and N of Kangaroo Flat Road.
- James Martin Reserve**
Gazetted: 25 Feb 1994
A reserve near the junction of Stewart Street and William Street in Port Macquarie. Origin: James Martin, known as Wee Jim, (16 Aug 1939 - 1 Jun 1992) was born in Glasgow, Scotland and arrived in Australia in 1962, coming to Port Macquarie in December 1972. He was an employee of Hastings Council from 28 October 1976 to 1 June 1992.
- James Ralfe Drive**
Sancrox. Named after the surveyor, James Ralfe, prominent in the early colony.
- James Street**
Wauchope. Named for James Bain.
- Jasper**
Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969
A parish (lands administrative division).

Jasper Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A minor trig station on Jaspers Peak about 5.6km SW of the locality of Forbes River, and about 6km SW of the village of Birdwood.
Jasper Creek Gazetted 10 Jan 1969	A partly perennial stream rising about 1km E of Jaspers Peak. It flows generally SW for about 5km into the Hastings River. Previous name Boggy Creek.
Jasper Mine	Copper mine at Yarras 6.5km from PO - an 80 acre site was taken up by T. McLennan of Yarras. (see PMN, 8 Oct 1904, p.6).
Jasper Nature Reserve Gazetted: 12 Feb 1988	A reserve administered by the NPWS located about 4km WNW of the junction of Forbes River with the Hastings River at Yarras.
Jaspers Copper Mine	The Copper Mine was operating in the Forbes Valley about 6.4km from Yarras in the 1980's and into the new century. Also known as Jasper's Peak Cooper Mine. (see HSG 17 Jan 1980, p.4).
Jaspers Peak Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A prominent mountain on which Jasper trig. station stands, about 5.6km SW of the locality of Forbes River, and about 6.8km SW of the village of Birdwood. Was the site of a copper mine in the early 1900s (see PMN, 8 Dec 1906, p.2).
Jaspers Peak Copper Mine	See Jaspers Copper Mine.
Jean Starr Reserve Gazetted: 7 May 1993	A reserve adjoining McLaren Drive and Brook Road, Port Macquarie. Origin: Jean Starr, OAM, founded the Koala Preservation Society in 1973.
Jerseyville	F. Delaforce's farm Blackmans Point (see PMN, 29 Jul 1916 & PMN, 16 Jul 1927).
Jobling Street	Captain George Jobling owned land at the junction of the Hastings and Maria Rivers. Known as 'Goolawa' he planted a small vineyard there.
Joffre Street	Port Macquarie. Possibly named after General Joffre, French commander World war One.
John Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A trig. station on Middle Brother Mountain about 4km NW by N of the village of Johns River. Previous name John New.

John Dick Reserve Gazetted: 5 Nov 1993	A reserve on the corner of Rushcutter Way and Burrawong Drive, Port Macquarie. Origin: The Dick family played a considerable role in the history of Port Macquarie and particularly to commemorate John Dick, the patriarch of the family. John Dick b. 7 Nov 1810 Bathgate, Linlithgow, Scotland, d 3 Jun 1857 Port Macquarie. Arrived Port Macquarie on <i>William IV</i> 1841, established the first tannery in the village. Reserve established as part of subdivision.
John Downes Park Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A coastal reserve for Public Recreation and Camping notified 17/3/1944. Located at Nobby Head, Port Macquarie. Previous name The John Downes Remembrance Park. John Downes was a Coucillor on the Port Macquarie Council for many years who passed away in 1942.
Johns Plains	Area north of Prospect with frontage to Maria River (see History of Port Macquarie, p.114).
Johns River Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	(1) A (parish) lands administrative division. (2) A river named after Capt. Frank Allman' eldest son John James Allman. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.46). Small township on Pacific Highway 12km S of Kew. The Trig station on the top of Middle Brother Mountain later took the same name.
Johns Swamp	A locality. Mrs Newberry lived here (see PMN, 14 Nov 1931, p.5)
Johnsons Flat	Bain's farm "Clareville" was here. The site of the first football ground at Wauchope 1880's - now occupied by the railway station and yards. (see PMN, 21 Jan 1983).
Johnstone Street	Wauchope. Named for an early pioneer family and mill owners.
Johnstones Flat	See Johnsons Flat.
Joker	Name of R. Woodland's gold mine at "The Cells" 1896.
Jolly Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A trig. station on Jolly Nose Rocks Mountain about 4.5km WNW of Bonny Hills village.
Jolly Nose Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality about 5km N of the town of North Haven. Queens Lake forms its southern boundary, and the localities of Herons Creek and Lake Innes adjoin to the north.
Jolly Nose Hill Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A mountain about 4.5km NW by W of Bonny Hills Village. It is surmounted by Jolly Trig. Station. Previous name Jolly Nose Rocks.

Jonas Absalom Drive	Port Macquarie. Jonas Absalom was the 3rd son of James Absalom who came to Port Macquarie sometime around 1877. James farmed in the area and he had a vineyard that was in the location of the present day golf club.
Jonathan Dickson Reserve Gazetted: 5 Mar 1999	A reserve at Lake Cathie bounded on the N by Kywong Street, on the SW by the rear boundaries of houses, on the S by Miolong Street and on the SE by Lake Cathie. Origin: The name commemorates Jonathan Dickson (14 May 1974 – 31 Dec 1988) who was caught in a rip at the beach and whose body was never recovered. The family, who came from Quakers Hill, started camping in the reserve. (Source: Dickson K and A, Jonathan's parents, letter received by Hastings Council 22 Jan 1998). The reserve is the former site of Lake Cathie Caravan Park. The latter name was not a recorded or assigned name. The name `Jonathan Dickson` was nominated by his family. Previous name Lake Cathie Caravan Park.
Jones Road	Runs south off Comboyne Road - 2km E of Byabarra.
Joppa	Tannery and orchard owned by the Dick family, in Horton Street Port Macquarie. (see PMN, 23 June 1945, p.1).
Joshua Close	Wauchope. Named after Joshua Galloway.
Joyces Creek	Yarrowitch area - North of Brassey State Forest and N of Kangaroo Flat Road.
Junction	Freehold of Thomas Watkins - there in January 1859.
