Kalobungung Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 4.8km ENE of Mount Micky Doran. It flows generally NNE for about 2km into Long Creek.
Kaluke	A property near the coast on the Maria River about 16.1km north of Port Macquarie (see Macleay Argus 6 March 1928, p.2).
Kaluke Creek	A creek near Crescent Head (see Macleay Argus 25 August 1891, p.2).
Kangaroo Flat	Yarrowitch area in Brassey State Forest.
Kapearrow Creek Gazetted: 14 Nov 1980	A watercourse about 10km long. It rises about 3km SW of Ralfes Peak and flows generally ESE into Doyles River.
Karaghin	Another name for Toms Creek. (see PMN, 2 April 1912, p.3).
Karaghine	Farm on Toms Creek - 12km NW of Comboyne.
Karikeree Creek Gazetted: 4 May 1973	A watercourse about 8.5km in length, rising in the Cowarra State Forest and flowing generally NE then E into Lake Innes. Previous name Five Mile Creek; Wrights Creek.
Karjoru Farm	Farm on Black Creek 5km W of Logans Crossing.
Karoonda	Farm on the Camden Haven River 8km W of Kendall.
Karramor	Farm off Jones road 6km SE of Byabarra.
Katarally	Home of James Lahey near Yarras - see Katarvalley.
Katarbuk	Property of Angus Kennedy. Long Flat area.
Katarvalley	Home of James Lahey (Snr) near Yarras 1877.
Kathie Estate	John Young Butler's land. Watered from 10 Mile Creek near Cathie – Oct 1888 – then A.B. Butler 17 th October 1891 – in Lake Cathie area (see PMN, 15 May 1920, p.4).

<p>Kattang Nature Reserve Gazetted: 21 Dec 1984</p>	<p>A reserve administered by the NPWS Located at Camden Head, about 4km E of Laurieton. Origin: Named after the first peoples of the Kattang or Kutthung language group. The Kattang lived in the Port Macquarie area and extended south down the coastline.</p>
<p>Keenas Creek</p>	<p>Later name for Blue Creek - Keena's had property there in 1897. See Blue Creek.</p>
<p>Kelvin Grove</p>	<p>Port Macquarie. Named after one of two grazing properties owned by L. Halbisch developer.</p>
<p>Kemp Street</p>	<p>Port Macquarie. Named after Major Kemp (1782-1856) who came to Port Macquarie in 1837 to command the military detachment until he retired in 1838.</p>
<p>Kemps Pinnacle</p>	<p>Mountain 45km W of Kempsey (see Place of Banishment p.86). Peak NW of Mt. Boss and NW of Upper Pappinbarra.</p>
<p>Kendall Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993</p>	<p>A town/locality on the North Coast Railway, 53km N of Taree, and 21km S of Wauchope. Originally known as Camden Haven. Changed to Kendall on 1 October 1891 after the poet Henry Kendall who lived and worked in the area.</p>
<p>Kendall District Rural School Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972</p>	<p>A Public School in Comboyne Street, Kendall.</p>
<p>Kendall National Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972</p>	<p>National Forest in the Taree Forestry District area about 346 hectares.</p>
<p>Kendall Public School Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973</p>	<p>A School in Comboyne Street, Kendall. Previous name Kendall District Public School.</p>
<p>Kendall State Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972</p>	<p>State Forest in the Taree Forestry District. Area about 346 Hectares.</p>
<p>Kendalls Hill</p>	<p>Property on Rawdon Island one time owned by Henry Dick Kendall (1861-1950) - 37 acres of land with hill enclosed. Site of Rawdon Island Hall.</p>
<p>Kennedy Drive</p>	<p>Port Macquarie. The Kennedy family had land in the vicinity of the present Kennedy Drive where they grew fruit and vegetables in the early decades of the 1900s. Stewart Kennedy was president of the local Agricultural Bureau which was formed on 1940.</p>

Kennedys Mountain	A plateau rising to the south of Forbes River, about 11.2km W of Birdwood. The top of the mountain was owned by Donald Kennedy. (see The Rise and Fall of Yarras Mill by Winifred Godfrey).
Kennedys Mountain Road	Runs NW from Forbes River Road at Birdwood.
Kennedys Pineapple farm	See Kennedy Drive. Later site of Fantasy Glades, Pacific Drive, Port Macquarie.
Kenny Drive	Port Macquarie. The road from Pacific Drive to John Downes Park above Nobbys Beach. Mr J. L. Kenny was the President of the John Downes Park trust. (see PMN, 30 April 1948, p.7) He was also the secretary of the local A.L.P. branch.
Kenussie	Another name for Jeremiah Warlter's land at Wright's Creek.
Kerewong Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A parish (lands administrative division).
Kerewong Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality 6km S of Swans Crossing and Wauchope railway line. The Camden Haven River flows through the locality, which contains parts of the Upsalls Creek, Kerewong, and Comboyne State Forests.
Kerewong Siding Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A railway station siding on the North Coast Railway about 6.5km by rail north of Herons Creek Railway Station.
Kerewong State Forest Gazetted: 23 March 1973	State Forest in the Taree Forestry District. Area about 2352h.
Kew Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A trig. station about 4km SW of the town of Herons Creek.
Kew Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village/locality about 2km E of the town of Kendall and west of Laurieton. Originally on the Pacific Highway now bypassed. Originally known as Cross Roads but was renamed after Mr Keough, a Scot who owned the parcel of land from the hotel corner to where the police station was. His surname was corrupted to Kew. He was a coach driver in 1898 (Source: Footprints and Foundations. Kew Ross Glen Herons Creek)
Kew State Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	State Forest in the Taree Forestry District. Area about 624h.
Kileys Hill	On the Oxley Highway west of Gannons Creek before Hyndman's Creek. Named after Caelli family of Gannons Creek.

Killara	Property of Francis George Hollis - Pappinbarra Creek - later to Paul Hollis.
Killick Beach	Beach between Crescent Head and Hat Head North of Port Macquarie.
Killiecrankie	Farm on Kindee Road 10km W of Ellenborough.
Killivinning Estate	Original grant of Hughes & Hosking in the area now known as The Hatch - James Munn had the land before that (1839). Bailiff sale John Wisely 21 Nov 1891 (see PMN, 31 Dec 1892). The name derives from the Scottish place Killwinning and has been mis-transcribed at some stage. (see Estate names - Port Macquarie and District. Dawson, 2014)
Killmeen	Station on Brombin/Kindee Ck about 8km NW of Gannons Creek on the North side of Hastings River. In the Pipeclay region Near Wauchope.
Killuke	Farm east of the Maria River Road 2km SW of Crescent Head. Alfred Thompson had a farm there - 1869/70 electoral roll - on Maria River.
Killuke Lodge	see Killuke
Kilninian	Residence on corner Lord/ Burrawan Streets - Housing Commission completed 1966 - 1968.
Kilven	A station 1km S of Rollands Plains and W of the Rollands Plains Road.
Kindee Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A parish (lands administrative division).
Kindee Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A minor trig. station about 5.6km SW of the locality of Pappinbarra Junction and about 7km NE of the village of Birdwood.
Kindee Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A scattered settlement/locality on Kindee Creek about 6km NNW of the village of Ellenborough.
Kindee	Home of Newman Hollis on Kindee Creek - named after his father's property in Devon, England - just off Kindee Road near Long Flat. An article in the Hastings Shire Gazette (10 Jun 1976) by Stanley Kennedy of Birdwood says " <i>My father believed that the original name for Kindee was Tindee because some of the early settlers called it that!</i> "
Kindee Close	Probably named for the village in the Hastings. The village was given this name by an early settler, Newman Hollis, after his father's property in Devon, England.

Kindee Creek Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 800m NNW of Kindee Trig. Station. It flows generally SW then SE for about 20km into the Hastings River about 3.2km NE of Ellenborough. Previous name Kindee Brook.
Kindee Road	Runs NW off Oxley Highway 3km W of Long Flat.
King Creek Gazetted: 19 Jan 2007	A locality about 6km S of Wauchope. The locality of Lake Innes adjoins to the east. Origin: John Oxley named the waterway Kings River on 4 October 1818, after marine surveyor Phillip Parker King. Name changed from Kings Creek to King Creek at the request of residents and Council on 19 January 2007. Previous name Kings Creek, Kings River.
King Cutting	See Schoolhouse Ridge
King Neptune Park	A former dolphin and sea life park that operated in Port Macquarie at the southern break wall from 1974 to 1989. Originally known as Port Macquarie Marine Park
King Street	Port Macquarie off Hill Street near Pacific Drive end. Possibly named after Phillip Parker King who accompanied Oxley in 1819 to travel up the Hastings River.
Kingfisher Park	An animal park in Port Macquarie that was situated on Kingfisher Road, near Wrights Road, off John Oxley Drive. It opened in 1989 and closed on January 31, 2001.
Kingfisher Park Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A reserve about 4km NE of Lake Innes and about 3km SW by W of Port Macquarie.
Kings Creek Gazetted: 23 Mar 1973	A partly perennial stream which rises about 9km SSW of the town of Wauchope, it flows generally W and then ENE for about 11km into the Hastings River. Previous name Narran River. (See King Creek, Kings Creek)
Kings Point Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A point in the North Shore of the Hastings River, opposite Hibbard Ferry, about 3.5km NW of the town of Port Macquarie. Named by R. N. King who purchased the land in 1865. His wife was the daughter of Major William Kemp who came to Port Macquarie in 1837.
Kings River	Named after Phillip Parker King Noted by Lt. John Oxley 4 Oct 1818 and later renamed King Creek. (see History of Port Macquarie p.16-17 & Place of Banishment p.23). Runs north into Hastings River at Kings Bridge on the Oxley Highway.

Kingussie	Port Macquarie. Original grant of land to Jeremiah Warlters 1,920 acres. Named after the Scottish town of the same name in Invernesshire.
Kippara Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A parish (lands administrative division).
Kippara Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality which contains part of the Mount Boss State Forest. The Wilson River runs through it, and Gearys Flat adjoins to the north. Station on Little's Loop Road off Glen Esk Road Upper Rollands Plains. Home of Keith Adams 1914 - at Rollands Plains - sold to a man named Wilkinson. New home of Wilkinson (see PMN, 4 Apr 1914) bought from Keith Adams. Name believed to be an Aboriginal word for the initiation ceremony for young warriors.
Kippara Creek Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A non-perennial stream rising on western slopes of Marowin Mountain. It flows generally SSW for about 4km into Banda Creek.
Kippara Forest	Forest and Forestry camp on the North bank of the Wilson River Upper Rollands Plains.
Kippara State Forest Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	State forest No. 641 in the forestry district of Wauchope with an area of 18,130 acres.
Knobbys Rock	Early name for Bird Rock Port Macquarie. (see History of Port Macquarie p.38).
Knodubgul Road	Runs NS from Oxley Highway - West of Mt. Seaview in Bulga State Forest.
Koala	Property of Albert Wallace Smith, Batar Creek, Kendall (see obituary Camden Haven Courier 3 Feb 1966).
Koala Street	Port Macquarie. Runs from Ocean Drive Kennedy Drive. Name fairly self-evident.
Kogo Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A trig station about 3km S by E of Gearys Mountain and about 4km NE of Upper Rollands Plains locality.
Kogo Brook	Property of Magnus McLeod on the Wilson River (see History of Port Macquarie p.116).
Kogo Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A watercourse about 6km long. Originates near Geary's Flat and rises about 2km SW of Gearys Mountain and flows generally S then SE into the Wilson River near Upper Rollands Plains.
Kokamerican	Property at Yarras belonging to Reg Hollis.

Kokomerican Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A minor trig station about 6.8km NNE of Ralfes Peak Trig Station and about 7.2km NE of the locality of Glen Oxley. Previously named Sea View.
Konunk Kosh Kosh	Hills west of Bunnoo River - 20km NW of Comboyne.
Konunk Kosh Kosh Gazetted: 29 May 1970	A hill peak at the north end of a ridge about 8km NE of Mount Mickey Doran and about 3.2 km NW of Mount Botumboin.
Kookaburra	Small community on mountain road about 40km north of Upper Pappinbarra.
Kookamerica	Property at Forbes River - Edwin Cooper had it in July 1904 - near Ellenborough. (see 14 Nov 1901 p.5)
Koolabung Creek	Possibly of Aboriginal origin with 'Koola' meaning water and 'bung' a tree. (see PMN, 26 March 1921). See Kooloonbung Creek.
Koolenbang Creek	See Kooloonbung Creek.
Koolobungan Creek	Name given to Kooloonbung Creek during Hodgkinson visit of 1840. See Kooloonbung Creek.
Koolonbung Creek	See Kooloonbung Creek.
Koolook	Jeremiah Warlters land on the north shore at Port Macquarie.
Kooloonbung Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A stream rising about 3km NW by W of Transit Hill. It flows generally NNE for about 3.5km into Hastings River, S of Pelican Island. Previous name Shoal (Arm) Creek. (see A History of Port Macquarie p.32 and a Place of Banishment p.69). Has also been referred to as Coolenbang (Koolenbang) Creek (see Place of Banishment, p 211). Alternate spellings include Coonlonbung, (Koonlonbung), Koolobungan and Koolabung. Possibly of Aboriginal origin with 'Koola' meaning water and 'bung' a tree. (see PMN, 26 March 1921).
Kooloonbung Dam	Gordon St. Port Macquarie - commenced in 1843 - was a dam and a bridge - (see History of Port Macquarie, p.133).
Koorebang Nature Reserve	Located to the north of Bitter Ground Creek, which flows east into the Forbes River. Formerly part of Mount Boss State Forest, the reserve is approx. 465 ha in area and was created in 1997.
Koorinal	Farm on Thone Creek road 3km NW of Byabarra.
Koppin Yarratt	"A bridle track from there to Comboyne 19 Nov 1904"- this was probably on the track up from Kendall as there was no road to

Wauchope for some time. Koppin Yarratt road runs from Upper Lansdowne to Comboyne up the escarpment.

Koree

Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972

A parish (lands administrative division).

Koree

Property on north side of the Hastings River on, Koree Island, 6km W of Wauchope.

Koree Island

Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993

A rural locality about 2km NE of Huntingdon and about 3km S of Beechwood. Was called Korrie Korrie which was the Aboriginal word for the name of the Aboriginals in the plural, and Korrie in the singular.

Korikeree Creek

Runs E from Cowarra forest across the Pacific Highway to Lake Innes - another name for Five Mile Creek.

Kowara

From the Postal Directory of NSW 1832 - Cross Ten Mile creek at the village reserve of Kowara - between 10 Mile Creek and 5 Mile Creek.

Krogy Estate

Yarras district 1913 - A. Doyle caretaker (see PMN 4 Jan 1913)

Kullatine Creek

15km W of Kempsey.

Kumbatine Creek

Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973

A watercourse about 8km long. It rises about 4km NE by N of Tuckybunyubah Mountain and flows generally SE into Glencoe Creek. Previous name Kumbatine Brook

Kundabung

Village 14km N of Telegraph Point on the north coast railway. Name of Aboriginal origin meaning 'wild apples'.

Kunderang

Capt. Jobling's squattage Macleay River - 40,000 acres (see History of Port Macquarie, p.117).

Kurrakine

On Thone Creek - Dennis Kilmurray born there (see PMN, 21 Apr 1917)

Kwinana Lane

Port Macquarie. Named after steamship "Kwinana".

Kyeema

Private hospital of Nurse B.C. Way Gordon St. Port Macquarie 1926.

Kylies Hut

Camping area just south of Diamond Head. Kylies Hut is an historic hut that was built by local man Ernie Metcalfe for Australian author Kylie Tennant who moved to the area during World War II. Kylie used the hut as a writer's retreat, no doubt using the stunning scenery of the park for inspiration. Ernie Metcalfe, Diamond Head and Crowdy Bay are all portrayed in Tennants's book (See The Man on the Headland).
