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- La Mascotte** House on the SW corner of Hay and William Streets Port Macquarie built in 1882 for John Hayward - mortgaged to Bank of NSW - bought by Jacob Healy in 1909 for £700 - named by him La Mascotte - sold to Arthur A. Cummings for £1000 in 1925. Priest bought it in 1988 (see PMN, 29 Sep 1978, p.2)
- Lachlan Bay** A canal located between Sirius Close and Francis Street, Port Macquarie.
Gazetted: 25 Feb 1994
- Lady Elliott Circuit** Port Macquarie. Named after the Lady Elliott lighthouse at the southern end of the Great Barrier Reef.
- Lady Evelyn** Gold mining lease at The Cells sold by Andrews Bros. to a Melbourne syndicate for £18,000 6 Jun 1896.
- Lady Nelson Beach** Very early name for Town Beach because the ship "Lady Nelson" was beached and repaired there with the first fleet in April 1821. (See Australian, 4 Jan 1840).
- Lady Nelson Drive** Port Macquarie. The ship 'Lady Nelson' was one of the first three ships to bring soldiers and convicts to Port Macquarie in April 1821. The ship lost her rudder and stern post when attempting to leave Port Macquarie on the 2 May 1821.
- Laguna Place** Port Macquarie. Name is supposedly of Aboriginal origin.
- Lake Cathie** An intermittent lake about 1.5km WSW of village of Lake Cathie.
Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973
- Lake Cathie** A village locality about 22km by road S of the town of Port Macquarie. Alternate spellings have included Cattai, Cat-Eye, Catti. Lake of the same name.
Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993
- Lake Hope** See Gogleys Creek/Lagoon.
- Lake Innes** A perennial lake (lagoon) about 8km SW of the town of Port Macquarie. Origin: INNES LAKE so named after Archibald Clunes Innes. Name changed from Lake Burrawan when Major Mitchell approved Major A.C. Innes application for a grant of land bordering the Lake. Major Innes named his house there 'Innes Mansion'. Previously named Burrowan; Burrawan, believed to refer to the burrawang nut which the traditional owners of the land used to make a type of brown flour.
Gazetted: 23 March 1973

Lake Innes Gazetted: 11 Aug 2000	A locality/suburb located near the perennial lake of the same name about 8km SW of the town Port Macquarie. Assigned by Erratum 16 June 2000. (Omitted 16 April 1993).
Lake Road	Believed to be the road that was used to go to Lake Innes Reserve before it was diverted across to the Oxley Highway.
Lake Street	Laurieton. The road to Queens Lake.
Lakewood Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village locality on the south western edge of Queens Lake about 4km NW of Laurieton.
Lambfield	Property of J.B. Smith Rollands Plains. 18 May 1899. Mrs H.J. Halliday's property - used to be known as "Sixty Acres" which her father bought about 1868 (see PMN, 16 Sep 1922). Property of E. A. Beer Ballengarra (see PMN, 29 Jan 1921).
Langley Vale	Locality near Cooperook. Property of J. H. Parker 1906.
L'anthony	Property in the Ellenborough /Upper Hastings region. Thomas and John Browning there in 1869/70 electoral roll. See also Llanthony.
Lasiandra Park Gazetted: 28 Jun 1991	A reserve for public recreation situated on the corner of Cameron Street and Blackbutt Drive, Wauchope. Origin: The town of Wauchope has adopted the Lasiandra tree as its community emblem and has an annual Lasiandra Festival. Formerly State Forest, area revoked as part of Broken Bago State Forest in 1987 when Council accepted care and control of the area.
Latimores Road	Comboyne. The road leading to the property owned by T C Latimore.
Laura Cottage	Port Macquarie. Possibly James Blair owned this - his daughter Laura Annie married there in 1894.
Laurel Street	Kendall. So named for the large camphor laurel tree that used to grow there. It was removed for road widening.
Laurie Park Gazetted: 27 Oct 1989	A reserve in the town of Laurieton bounded by Bold Street, Kew Road and Castle street. Named after R. L. (Mac) Laurie, who passed away on the 14th December 1988. He was the direct grandson of the founder of the village of Laurieton, Joseph Laurie, and a prominent worker for the community. Originally called Remembrance Park.

Laurieton Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	Town on the Camden Haven River below North Brother Mountain. Originally known as Peach Orchard. It was recommended to the Post Master General that a Post Office be erected at Peach Orchard and the name be changed to Laurie Town after the Laurie brothers. The Laurie brothers Andrew, Alexander and Joseph, arrived in 1840 to build a timber Mill. (Joseph Laurie had a timber mill there in 1875.) The Post Master General's Office agreed to the erection of the post office; however the town was named Laurieton.
Laurieton Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A trig. station off Camden Head about 4km E of Town of Laurieton.
Laurieton Public School Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A school in Bold Street, Laurieton.
Laurieton Sporting Complex Gazetted: 28 Aug 1992	A reserve in the town of Laurieton bounded by Lake, Tunis, Short and Castle Streets.
Lavoca	Property of Bert Noakes Ellenborough. (See obituary PMN, 2 Jun 1966).
Lepemi Place	North Haven. Named by Robert Clinch, the original developer of the subdivision, after his children <u>L</u> eonie, <u>P</u> eter and <u>M</u> ichael. The first two letters of each of their names make up the street name.
Letterewe Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A rural locality about 5km SE of Beechwood and about 2km NNW of Wauchope.
Letterewe	Alexander Bain's family property at Wauchope, stretching from the Hastings River to Bago Mountains. The name comes from a Gaelic word meaning bank or river. Named after a large estate in Ross County Scotland where Alexander was born.
Leumeah	Farm in the Maria River State Forest - Parish of Tinebank.
Liberdell	A. Johnston Rollands Plains 7 Jul 1900.
Liberty Hall	Town House of Commander Thomas Caswell RN. Situated next to Paget Hall in Clarence Street Port Macquarie - Bank of NSW rented it in 1880 before building their own in Horton Street. (See History of Port Macquarie p.111).
Lighthouse Beach Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A beach starting south of Tacking Point and running south to Lake Cathie.

Lighthouse Gully Gazetted: 29 June 1973	A stream rising about 3.5km SSE of town of Port Macquarie. It flows generally SE for about 1km into the South Pacific Ocean near Tacking Point. Previous name Lighthouse Creek.
Lighthouse Road	Road that runs from Pacific Drive out to Tacking Point lighthouse.
Lightning Ridge Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A ridge extending in SE direction for about 6.4km from the range about 2.8km SW of Mount Banda Banda to the Wilson River - Cascade Creek Junction.
Lillybank	See Lilybank.
Lilybank	Home of S. Andrew's family Wauchope.
Lime Station	Located between the Wilson and Macleay Rivers - the site of lime works. (See 'Wilson River News' PMN, 17 Apr 1915).
Limeburners Creek	(1) A watercourse approx. 15km long originating in Saltwater Lake west of Point Plomer running south into the Hastings River near Settlement Point. Convicts used to make lime for brick mortar from oysters which were burnt and crushed. Limeburners Creek produced some 80% of lime for the Hastings River settlement. (2) Another creek running into Queens Lake at Laurieton was also named Limeburners for the same reason. (3) Captain Highman was given a grant of land in this location.
Limeburners Creek Nature Reserve Gazetted: 14 Nov 1975	A large nature reserve administered by the NPWS. It extends along Limeburners Creek and northwards along the coast to Big Hill Point. Assigned on 14/11/75.
Limeburners Flat Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A flat on the western banks of Limeburners Creek. It is about 2.5km W of Bonny Hills Village.
Lincoln Hall	George Andrews built it in 1907- in Bago Road - now Cameron St - Wauchope (see PMN, 27 Aug 1921, p.4). John Suters lived here in 1921.
Lindfield Park	Property north of Lake Innes on the Oxley Highway west of Port Macquarie near Thrumster. Lindfield Road runs nearby.
Lindsays Hill Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A hill about 3km SE of Hartys Plains locality and about 3km SW of Huntingdon. Previous name Lindseys Hill.
Linwood	Station on the Wilson River 4km NE of Ballengarra and SW of Gum Scrub.
Lions Lookout	Port Macquarie. At Goal Point overlooking Town Beach.
Litchfield Parkway	Stirling Green, Port Macquarie. Named after George Litchfield an early resident.

Litchfield Store	Building located in Horton Street Port Macquarie.
Litchfields	House of George Litchfield on the NW corner of Horton and William Streets Port Macquarie. Later Oxley Airlines. Bought by P.A. Hayward for £75 (see PMN, 10 Dec 1921).
Little Beach	Beach immediately south of Grants Head Bonny Hills. Now known as Bartletts beach.
Little Darling	Gold mining lease at The Cells.
Little Nobby	Headland at Crescent Head.
Little Rawdon Island Gazetted: 11 Oct 1974	An island bounded by Munns Channel and Rawdon Channel. About 11.5km WNW of the town of Port Macquarie. Previous name Rawdon Island North.
Little Run Creek Gazetted: 14 Nov 1980	A watercourse about 7km long. It rises about 8km SE of Yarras Trig Station. and flows generally NE into Ellenborough River.
Little Rushes Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 4km ENE of Yarras Trig Station. It flows generally east for about 3.2km into Rushes Creek.
Little Stony Gully Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A partly perennial stream rising 6.5km NNE of the village of Johns River. It flows generally SE for about 2km into Stony Creek. Previous name Little Stony Creek.
Little Toms Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A partly perennial stream rising about 4.5km SW of the town of Comboyne. It flows generally north by west for about 4.8km into Toms Creek.
Little Upsalls Gully Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 2.5km NE of Mount Kophi. It flows generally ENE for about 2.5km into Upsalls Creek. Previous name Little Upsel Creek.
Llanthony	Property south of the Hastings River just north of Bagnoo on the Oxley Highway. Name is Welsh and was brought in by Thomas Browning, an early settler. See also L'anthonny.
Llewen Hill	Property of James Wallis Coombes, Harty's Plains Road, Brombin. Later owned by Jack Gibson.
Lochiel	Residence of G. Lindsay at Port Macquarie in 1911. A location in Scotland, seat of the Cameron Clan.
Logans Crossing Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality about 3.5km SSW of the town of Herons Creek.
Logans Crossing Road	Kendall. Named after Anne Logan, a registered midwife

Loggy Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A stream rising about 4km SSE of Mount Cairncross. It flows generally E then SE by S for about 7km into Balyngara Creek.
Lone Pine Hill Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A prominent hill on the S. edge of Comboyne Plateau about 0.75km SE of Mount Gibraltar and about 1.25 km S.W. of Mount Kophi. Previous name Lone Pine Mountain.
Lonely Point	Station on the south bank of the Hastings River on north side of the Oxley Highway about 5km W of Ellenborough. Home of James and Sarah Gibbons in the 1850s. (Source: History of Long Flat, p.11). See Long Flat.
Lonesome Pines	Property on Frazers Road north of Beechwood.
Long Bridge	A footbridge that was in Bridge Street Port Macquarie - in 1844 this connected Port Macquarie (East) with Port Macquarie (West). (see T. Dick article PMN, 9 Jul 1921, p.4). Foot bridge used to transport rock from Aston Hill to the southern break wall during construction.
Long Creek Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A partly perennial stream rising about 0.75km SE of Innes Trig Station. It flows generally north for about 8.8km into Ellenborough River. Previous name Kooloonbung Creek.
Long Flat Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village locality on the southern bank of the Hastings River about 2km ENE of Ellenborough and about 7km SE of the village of Kindee. Originally named 'Lonely Point' by Thomas Henry around 1850. It was a part of the Henry property which they settled around 1856. The area was used for bridle races and then emerged as a village from the Travellers Rest Hotel as other businesses came.
Long Flat 700251820	A primary school in the village of Long Flat.
Public School Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	
Long Flat Reserve Gazetted: 11 Dec 1992	A reserve on the Oxley Highway at Long Flat located about 30km west the Parish of Cowangra.
Long Ridge Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A ridge forming the watershed between Stony and Toms Creeks, extending in a northerly direction for about 5.2km from an unnamed range to the junction of Stony Creek and Toms Creek.
Longworth Road	Dunbogan. Named after the Longworth family who were early settlers and pioneers of the timber industry in the Camden Haven.
Loop Road	Northern loop road which runs around Upper Rollands Plains settlement.

Lord Street	Possibly named after Simeon Lord who was an ex-convict. He became a prominent man in Sydney. In the 1820s he was a ship owner and one of the earliest cedar traders. Lord Street was named before 1936.
Lorna Doone	W.H. Branch home in West port - 1930 (see PMN, 29 Mar 1930).
Lorne Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A trig. station about 2km SW of the village of Upsalls Creek.
Lorne Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village locality about 11km by road from SW of Upsalls Creek, W of Laurieton on the road to Comboyne. Origin: Lorne so named after the Scottish town of the same name in Argyllshire.
Lorne	A reserve within Lorne State Forest about 9km SE of Byabarra & about 11km W of Herons Creek (locality).
Flora Reserve Gazetted: 11 Apr 2003	
Lorne Mountain Gazetted: 26 Jun 1987	A hill rising 221m from Camden Haven River, about 4km NE of Lorne & about 5km WSW of Kendall. Lorne Trig. Station is located on the summit. Previous name Chippys Mountain.
Lorne Park	Farm 2 km S of Lorne.
Lorne State Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	State Forest in the Taree Forestry District. Area about 4957h.
Loudon Channel	Channel between Rawdon Island North and the mainland - later became Munns Channel. Runs northwards around Rawdon Island - western side named after a family name in Francis Rawdon Hastings first Marquis of Hastings. Previously known as Loudon Branch (Source 'An Historical Account of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependant Settlements' by James Wallis).
Lovers walk	Lovers Walk was a track along the foreshore from the top of Hill Street. It ran for a couple of hundred yards. (See PMN, 16 Jan 1991). South of Windmill Hill (absorbed to become part of Pacific Drive). A popular place for lovers to stroll along. (see David Martin, Port Macquarie Then and Now 2014, pp.179 & 197).
Lower Falls Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A waterfall on the Hastings River about 11km NE of Mount Seaview. It has a total drop 320 feet.
Lower Kings Folly Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A stream rising about 10km NW of the locality of Bellangry. It Flows generally NW then N for about 6km into Wilson River.
Lower Pappinbarra Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality about 2km W of Pappinbarra trig station and about 4km SE of Hollisdale locality.

Lowtown	Mrs E. Kilmurray of Thone Creek - 130 acres, 50 acres freehold, plus 5 roomed house and kitchen most securely fenced - 3 paddocks 40 acres maize, good orchard fruit trees of all kinds, 5 roomed house and kitchen,- good shingled barn with sawn floor for sale 8 Mar 1902'. 15miles from Wauchope 12 miles from Beechwood.
Luncheon Flat	Located half way up Kennedy Mountain. (see The Rise and Fall of Yarras Mill by Winifred Godfrey).
Lyddington	Station 8km W of Beechwood on the south side of Pappinbarra Road.
Lyn Vale	Farm on Beech Road south of Ellenborough River 6km west of Ellenborough Falls.
Lynidon	Station east of Wilson River and NW of Telegraph Point.
Lynnton	Private hospital of Nurse Spence Port Macquarie (see PMN, 26 Apr 1921). Home of Montague Smith, Shire Engineer Lord Street.
Lynwood	Dairy property of M. Harradine Ballengarra. (see PMN, 10 May 1924, Clearance sale, before leaving the district).
