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MacDuffs Hill	Another name for Aston Hill at West Port - applied when it was in the ownership of Robert MacDuff.
Machins Forest Road	Forest road between Cells River and Ellenborough Falls.
Mackay Street	Wauchope. Eric Mackay was a surveyor (1929).
Mackellar	A road at Stirling Green, Sovereign Hills, Port Macquarie. Probably named for Sir Charles Kinnaird Mackellar (1844-1926), physician, politician and businessman, who was born on 5 December 1844 in Sydney. Educated at Sydney Grammar School, Charles moved with his family to the Port Macquarie district about 1860. He spent several years on the land before proceeding to Scotland to attend the University of Glasgow (M.B., Ch.M., 1871). Returning to Sydney he registered with the Medical Board of New South Wales on 25 March 1872. He died at his residence, Rosemont, Woollahra, on 14 July 1926 and was buried in the Anglican section of Waverley cemetery. His daughter Dorothea wrote the well-known poem 'My Country'.
Macks Creek	South of Comboyne east of Thone Creek.
Macquarie Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A parish lands administrative division.
Macquarie Nature Reserve Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A nature reserve dedicated on 7th April, 1966 and situated at Wrights Creek between Lord Street and Everard Street, Port Macquarie.
Macquarie New Inn	Building located in Horton Street Port Macquarie and operated by Joseph Phillips in 1834.
Macquarie Place	Port Macquarie. Named after SS 'Macquarie' a vessel of the Cains Coastal Co-operative Steamship Co. active in NSW coastal trade between Port Macquarie and Sydney .The ship was lost during WW2.
Mad Frenchmans Creek	see Moripo River.
Maher Road	Originally a part of Livingstone Road. Named after Patrick John Maher who died in 1886.

Maher Street	Wauchope. Maher family were local landholders.
Mahers Creek Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A watercourse about 4 km long. It rises at Bago Bluff and flows generally north into the Hastings River about 8km WSW of Wauchope.
Mahers Hill	Property near Kendall. (see PMN, 23 August 1919, p.5).
Mahers Paddock	Wauchope. Early name for area, now part of Randall Street.
Mahers Point	In the Lake Innes area supposedly changed from Argents Point of the Argent family.
Mahogany Hill	Port Macquarie - once a stand of magnificent mahogany E of present Lake Road. A road by that name in that area now. A subdivision went there in about the 1980's.
Mahogany Road	Runs east off the Pacific Highway north of Dennis Bridge towards The Hatch.
Main Street	(1) Ross Glen. The main street. (2) Kendall. See Comboyne Street.
Major Innes Road	Port Macquarie. Originally known as Lake Innes Road. Named after Major Archibald Clunes Innes (1800-1857). A.C. Innes moved from this area and settled on another property in New England; Glen Innes is named after him.
Malcolm Vale	Farm on North Branch Road and Upsalls Creek - 10km west of Kendall.
Maldon	Property of Thomas Warlters Rawdon Island. L.P. Warlters and H. Warlters (brothers) bought L.C. Dawes property known as Scotts Plains - they established the first Jersey stud at Rollands Plains. Originally named by James Ralfe, a farmer here, in 1837 after the place of the same name in England.
Marbuk Park	A former colonial themed park in Port Macquarie that had native animals, rodeos and replica colonial buildings. It was located near the Port Macquarie Golf Club and opened in 1970 closing in June 1974.
Marco Millican	20km NW of Telegraph Point. Another name for Molly Milligan's Hill Rollands Plains (see PMN, 31 Jan 1914).
Mareeba Crescent	An aboriginal name meaning "good".
Maria Anabranh Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	An anabranh of the Maria River about 2km N of Hacks Ferry locality. Previous name Ana Branch Maria River.

Maria Downs	Dairying property on the lower Maria River once the farm of Cain (Kane) - and later O'Donnell (about 1954) –about 19.3km NW of Port Macquarie.
Maria River	Originates in Kalateenee State Forest S of Kempsey runs generally S to enter the Hastings River at Blackmans Point. Name origin unclear, either: (1) Named after either Mrs F. Allman's sister (Maria); or (2) Captain F. Allman's second daughter (Maria); or (3) Named by Lieut. William E. B. Wilson who arrived in Port Macquarie in 1821 with the first fleet after his sister Maria. (see History of Port Macquarie p.46. see also PMN, 18 July 1994, p.11).
Marine Villa	House built by McLeary, home of H.R. Bridson 1902-1906, in William Street Port Macquarie. Home of Mrs J. Wrigley Port Macquarie - ' <i>consists of 4 rooms and kitchen</i> ' (see PMN, 13 Aug 1921).
Mariposa	Land bought by Rev. H. Kelly for his son George E. Kelly - in Limeburners Creek area Port Macquarie.
Market Place	Port Macquarie. So named as it is adjacent to land that was the site of the first colonial market garden.
Markwell	W. Ringland's Markwell Sawmills at Markwell (see PMN, 11 Oct 1913).
Marlee Merrikens	Was aboriginal sacred ground and meant "place of thunder". The Europeans called it Molly Milligan's as a term of ridicule of Aboriginal beliefs.
Marlo Creek	Originates in the Ballengarra Forest runs S into the Wilson River.
Marlo Merrican Gazetted: 16 Jun 2000	A locality about 20km NW of Telegraph Point. Ballengarra State Forest occupies much of the area, and the localities of Upper Rollands Plains and Gum Scrub adjoin its southern boundary.
Marlo Merrican Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A watercourse about 18km long. It rises about 6km WNW of Ballengarra trig station and flows generally SSE then SSE into the Wilson River.
Marlo Merican Millican	Region 20km NW of Telegraph Point.
Marlo Merrican Ridge Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A ridge starting about 6km NE of Upper Rollands Plains locality extending about 2km ending about 3km SW by S of Ballengarra trig station. Previous name Marlo Merrican Range.

Marowin Flora Reserve Gazetted: 11 Apr 2003	A flora reserve located within Kippara State Forest and Mount Boss State Forest.
Marumba Place	An Aboriginal word meaning "good".
Mary Ellen	Property on the south side of Comboyne road about 3km from the turn off from the Oxley Highway.
Masterville	Property of Robert Masters Fernbank Creek. (see PMN, 23 Nov 1907, p.2).
Matthew Flinders Drive	Port Macquarie. Named after the explorer who in 1802 tacked off the coast near the Hastings river mouth in his ship 'Investigator'. The point of land opposite this was named Tacking Point.
Mauldon	Originally an estate of 300 acres, near present Spencers Cutting towards Rawdon Island, on the south bank of the Hastings River in the Parish of Macquarie granted to James Ralfe. The name comes from the village of Mauldon in Bedfordshire, England where his father was Rector of St Mary's church for many years. Property was put up for sale in 1860.
May Villa	Home of Miss M. Rosenbaum Lord St. Port Macquarie. 'Piano tuition'. (see PMN, 1 Jul 1911).
Mayfair Place	Named in 1979 by the developer of Savoy Gardens Estate subdivision, Mr W.J. Kelly. It was so named to be in keeping with the English origin of the estate. (see PMN, 18 May 1979).
Mayfair Road	Port Macquarie. Formed part of the 'Savoy Gardens' subdivision and was so named to be keeping with the English origin of the estate.
Mayville	Property of W. Campbell Wauchope. (see PMN, 20 Sep 1919).
Mayworth Park Gazetted: 3 Oct 2014	A reserve of approximately 5500m ² , located near Mayworth Avenue and Widderson Street. Origin: The land in the area of Mayworth Avenue, comprises part of a subdivision dating back to 1979. The developers of the land were the May and Worthing families.
McGillvray Road	Bonny Hills. Named because it was the road leading to McGillvray's property.
McInherney Close	James McInherney was born in the Hastings and was the first mayor of Port Macquarie. He acquired a 300 acre property at Settlement Point in the 1870's. They gave the land that became known as McInherney Park and eventually their home was relinquished for the development of Broadwater Gardens.

McInherney House	Port Macquarie. The home was located in Horton Street. Later demolished to build the two storey Oxley County Council building.
McInherney Park Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A park beside the Hastings River towards Settlement Point. Named after James McInherney who was born in the Hastings and was the first mayor of Port Macquarie. He acquired a 300 acre property at Settlement Point in the 1870s. He gave the land that became known as McInherney Park and eventually the home was relinquished for the development of Broadwater Gardens.
McIntyre Close	Port Macquarie. Originally part of Granite Street. Named after Dr James McIntyre a native of Argyllshire, Scotland, who was a Government medical officer and was the first to occupy the surgeon's house, now part of St Thomas Rectory. He purchased a medical practice in Port Macquarie and died in 1853.
McLaren Drive	The name McLaren is that of an old local family. Daniel McLaren came to Australia in 1884 and a few years later he settled in the area.
McLeods Close	Lorne. Named after Donald and Elizabeth McLeod who were the original grantees of large portions of land in the vicinity of the road.
Mcleods Creek Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A partly perennial stream rising about 7km NW of Dellward. It flows general SE for about 9.5km into the Camden Haven River.
Merinda Drive	Aboriginal word for "a beautiful woman".
Mermaid Creek	Port Macquarie. Named after the ship "Mermaid" which was one of the original three ships that transported Soldiers and convicts to Port Macquarie in April 1821. The ship ran aground on the 18th April 1821 losing its rudder and stern plank.
Mermaid Crescent	Named after the ship "Mermaid" that ran aground on the Port Macquarie bar on April 17. 1821, losing her rudder and a stern plank. She was one of the three ships that carried the original expedition of convicts and soldiers to Port Macquarie.
Merri Merrican	From Dick Papers: - "As we drew near to Rollands Plains our black guide points to a steep hill named Merri Merican – "A hill of dogs"- and to the present day the place is a resort of dingoes.
Merrikan Creek	Originates in the Bellangarra Forest runs south into the Wilson River east of the Maria River.
Mesa Plateau Gazetted: 18 Jun 1982	A plateau which lies 3400 m SSW of Mount Werrikimbe and 8 km SE by E of Red Hill.
Meyrick Close	Stirling Green Port Macquarie. Named after Lieutenant Thomas Meyrick, Acting Engineer 1827.

Miandetta	Residence of Samuel John Hamilton of Ellenborough. Miandetta was also the name of Edmund Barton's home in Sydney. Barton, Australia's first Prime Minister, was the local member for the Port Macquarie area.
Middle Brother Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A mountain about 4 km NW by N of Johns River Village. It is surmounted by John Trig. Station. Previous name West Brother.
Middle Brother Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality W of Watson Taylors Lake, and E of the locality of Batar Creek.
Middle Brother National Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	National Forest in the Taree Forestry District area about 2984 hectares.
Middle Brother National Park Gazetted: 28 Jan 2003	Reserve. Previous name Yoorigan National Park.
Middle Brother State Forest Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	State Forest in the Taree Forestry District. Area about 2984 hectares.
Middle Gully Gazetted: 12 Sep 1980	A watercourse about 1 km long. It rises about 4 km ENE of Mount Kophi and flows generally E into Macks Creek. Previous name Middle Creek.
Middle Rock	South of Lake Cathie and north of Rainbow Beach (see H.S.G. Colonial Week supplement, 1991, p.7).
Middle Rock Point Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A point between Lake Cathie and the village of Bonny Hills, on the southern end of Lighthouse Beach. Previous name Middle Rock.
Middlemas Ford	On the Camden Haven River – (see T.G. Wilson Diary, p.50.)
Middleton Yards	Property at Long Flat. Joseph Almond a farmer was here in 1894. (see PMN, 3 Oct 1894, p.6).
Miggibirra	Farm on Bulli Creek Road 5km south of Byabarra.
Mile Scrub	Small village in the Rollands Plains area- James Harrower had the "Bonny Doone" hotel there 1904.
Miles Away	Property on the Clarefield-Dungay Creek road 22km NW of Telegraph Point (Marlo Merican).
Mill Hill	The site of the original timber mill established on the Innes Estate by Robert Charley Snr.

Mill Plains	An area around "Willsbro" of Freeman and Gorham named after the water and tread mill used there. Dr Stacy had it later. (see History of Port Macquarie p.115).
Mill Street	Port Macquarie. Named after Major Innes' flour mill which stood in that vicinity. It was the road that lead to the mill and is no longer in existence.
Milligans Bridge	On Milligan road 12km NW of Herons Creek.
Milo	A property of originally 1267 acres on the north bank of the Hastings River in the Parish of Redbank taken up by Thomas Paget Morton in 1834. Origin of name uncertain.
Mimosa Park Gazetted: 28 Aug 1992	A reserve in Mimosa Drive, Port Macquarie. Origin: Mimosa is the name of a type of Acacia or Wattle Tree.
Miners Beach Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A beach on the north coast between Shelly Beach and Tacking Point. It is about 4 km SE by S of the town of Port Macquarie and within the Sea Acres Nature Reserve.
Mines Road Flora Reserve Gazetted:26 Jun 1987	A reserve beside Cobrabald Creek within Bellangry State Forest, located 9 km NW of Bellangry. Origin: The reserve adjoins Mines Road which in the past gave access to mining areas.
Mingaletta Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	(1) A rural locality about 4km NNE of Cooperabung Hill and about 7 km NW of Torrens Island. (2) Station near the north coast railway 10km N of Telegraph Point near the junction of Pipers Creek with the Maria River.
Minmai	Station 2km W of Rollands Plains 1km N of "Brilbourne".
Minnamurra	Station between the Maria River and the Pacific Highway W of The Hatch. Station E of the Pacific Highway 1km W of Boomerang Island and SE of Telegraph Point.
Mitchells Falls Gazetted: 26 Jun 1987	A waterfall on Hartys Creek, about 8km SSW of Byabarra and about 21km W of Herons Creek (Locality)and 6km SW of Mt. Comboyne.
Mo-Hada	Property at Comboyne owned by Mr H Jones. In 1942 Henry Butler was share farming on the property.
Molly Milligan	A road - mentioned in Percy Reid's story-" <i>over Molly Milligan to Dungay Creek</i> "- on the road from " <i>Clarefield</i> " Upper Rollands Plains - goes to Ballengarra Forest lookout.
Mon Repos	See Moripo.
Monaghans Road	Brombin. So named because it was the road leading to Francis Monagahn's property.

Monambang	Aboriginal name for locality now known as Pembroke.
Montague House	Building located in High St. Wauchope belonged to Andrew Wade.
Montrose	Property on Koree Island 6km W of Wauchope.
Montrose Park Gazetted: 20 May 1988	A reserve in Bain Street, Wauchope. Origin: Named by Mr J.D. Graham after Montrose – a town in Scotland where the Graham family originated.
Mooneys Creek	In the Wilson River area.
Mooraback Creek	Originates in Merrikimbe State Forest (35kms N of Mt. Seaview) runs SW into Bishops Swamp Creek and then the Hastings River- N of Mt. Seaview.
Moorabark Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A parish (lands administrative division).
Moores Island Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	An Island at the northern end of Watson Taylors Lake about 3km SSW of Town of Laurieton.
Moorilah	Farm on Thone Creek S of Comboyne.
Moorside	Poultry farm of Mr James McCue just south of Telegraph Point. (see 2 October 1937, p.5 and an article on poultry by McCue see PMN, 22 Oct 1901, p.3).
Morcom	School for Aboriginals opposite Seventh Day Adventist church Wauchope 1892.
Morepo	See Moripo.
Moripo	Station on the S side of the Hastings River W of Gannons Creek and N of the Oxley Highway. Capt. Hyndman's land, later owners were Major Innes, Henry Zions (16 May 1903) then McBroom. Bert Watson on Major Innes Land: - "Moripo was constructed of bricks made at the Major Innes brickyards. The house was sited about half way between the Comboyne turn-off and Bagnoo. The story is told that "Moripo" is a derivative of Mon Repos and was named by the teams of labourers working on the road to Walcha - because of a chaise-lounge cut out of solid rock down near the river. This arduous task was performed by a French convict known as the Mad Frenchman with nothing more than a chisel and a rock for a hammer. After his work assignment he would wander away down to the river bank and when asked where he was going his reply was always the same - Mon Repos- It is said that he slept on his rock couch every night even in mid-winter.

Moripo Creek Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A partly perennial stream rising about 2km NE of the locality of Byabarra. It flows generally NE and east for about 6km into the Hastings River. Previous name Moropo Creek.
Moripo River	As above - was a soldier's barracks, see Moripo.
Moroka	Old school at Pembroke - was called that in the early days (see PMN, 14 May 1921).
Moroko Park	At Pembroke near Wauchope. Was the Aboriginal word for the cobra worm which was dug from water-logged wood in the stream and creeks. In 1914 the Stoney Creek Progress Association asked the Postmaster-Generals Department to name the new telephone exchange at Stoney Creek 'Moroko' but the request was declined citing similar names in use elsewhere. (see PMN, 3 Oct 1914, p.10).
Moropole	Property in Beechwood area - "road between Moropole and Hindman's Creek for repair" (see PMN, 22 Nov 1902).
Morrish Street	Port Macquarie. Named after Reverend Cannon Morrish, Minister in charge of St. Thomas' Church 1907 to 1913.
Morton Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A parish (lands administrative division).
Morton Street	Wauchope. Named for L.C. Morton MP.
Morton Vale	Station on Haydon Road 5km W of Bellangry.
Mortons Creek Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village locality about 5km NE by E of Pappinbarra trig station and about 6km NNW of Beechwood. Boundaries within the Hastings Council area.
Mortons Creek Gazetted: 16 Apr 1973	A stream rising about 8km NW by W of the locality of Bellangry. It flows generally SW, E, & SSE for about 31km into the Hastings River near Wauchope roughly in the vicinity of the junction of Beechwood Road and Pembroke Road, and just north-west of Bain Bridge. Named after Lieutenant Thomas Constant Paget Morton who was the recipient of a land grant of 1,267 acres in 1834. He lived at Paget Hall Port Macquarie.
Mortons Estate	On Morton's Creek. Michael Kelly there in July 1888.
Moruya Drive	Port Macquarie. From the Aboriginal word meaning "water spirit". Part of the Kennedy Park Estate subdivision of 1979. (see PMN, 18 May 1979).
Mount Adrah	Private Hospital of Sabina Reid (later Mrs Ponsford) - "brought babies into the world at Mt. Adrah private hospital, Gordon St. Port Macquarie." Adrah is a Hebrew word. (see PMN, 20 Feb 1926).

Mount Bally	About 12 miles south of Comboyne West.
Mount Banda Banda Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A prominent mountain with an 800ft precipice near the top about 4.8km NW of Marowin Mt and about 4.2km NE of Rocky Peak trig. station. Origin: Aboriginal: split, broken open.
Mount Boss Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A prominent mountain on which Boss trig station stands, about 1.6 km S of Camerons Bluff and about 5.6km NW of Pigeon Top trig station. Origin: In Mt. Boss Forest NW of Upper Pappinbarra -in the 1870s four men left the Upper Pappinbarra to look over the land to the west of the settlement. On a 10 day trek on foot they followed the creek to its source to ensure a supply of water and also to leave a trail to follow for the return journey. On 1 Dec 1926 they climbed a mountain and carved on a tree the initials of their names B.O.S.S. – for Jim Blanche, Ted Ostler, Charles Swanson and Bob Swanson. Later Jim Blanche returned and carved the letters Mt with the date. Years later this tree was discovered by surveyors who officially named the mountain Mt. Boss.
Mount Boss State Forest Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	State forest in the forestry district of Wauchope with an area of 42,958 hectares.
Mount Botumboin Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A prominent mountain about 9.6km N of Comboyne, and about 10.4km ENE of Mt Mickey Doran.
Mount Bulli Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A prominence on Comboyne Plateau about 1.25km S of Comboyne, and about 10km E of Sugarloaf Mountain.
Mount Burranbullitt Gazetted:12 Sep 1980	A hill about 12km NW by N of Comboyne and about 5km NE by N of Mt Mickey Doran. Alt. spelling Mount Burranbullit.
Mount Cairncross Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	(1) A mountain surmounted by Cairncross T.S., about 4km SW of the locality of Ballengarra. (2) West of Port Macquarie 24km inland and reaches a height of 536 metres. Originally known as Coolabarama 'the place where the eagle drinks' by the traditional owners of the land. So named because of the permanent rock water hole near its summit. (3) Another origin states that the mountain was known as Coolpatamba, a place where lightning strikes. The earth had a lot of iron content and drew the strikes. It was a sacred place to them. Origin of the European name: the origin of the European name, Cairncross, is uncertain but the best derivation is that it was named by Philip Parker King. His friend Baron Field was married to Jane Cairncross. (see Australian National Placenames Survey publication 'Mount Cairncross :a remarkable round-topped hill' (2014).
Mount Comboyne Gazetted: 4 May 1973	A hill surmounted by Comboyne New Trig. Station, about 5.5km SE of the village of Byabarra. Previous name Signal Hill.

Mount Gibraltar Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A prominent mountain on which Donkin Trig Station stands, about 3.6km NW of Mount Bally, about 1.2km W. of Lone Pine Hill and about 10km SW of West Comboyne near Boorganna.
Mount Haven	Property west of Kendall.
Mount Innes	About 10km NW of Comboyne near Toms Creek.
Mount John	Patrick of Patrick Doyle and family originally Chris Doyles. Adjoining "Clareview" between Ballengarra and Rollands Plains on the east side of the road. J. Doyle in 1906.
Mount Konunk Kosh Kosh	12km SW of Ellenborough.
Mount Kophi Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A prominent mountain about 5.2km NW. of Savilles Rock, and about 2km ENE of Mount Gibraltar, about 6km S of Comboyne W Thone River.
Mount Lookout	West Comboyne. W Debreceny had a cheese factory there (see PMN, 12 Dec 1914).
Mount Mickey Doran Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A prominent mountain about 6.5 km W of Innes trig. station and about 12km NW of Comboyne.
Mount Pleasant	(1) Property near Yarras - O'Doherty sold to E.A. Coombes 12 Apr 1902. (2) Home of S.A. McCann, Maria River (see PMN, 23 Apr 1921) (3) Home of Webber family, Wilson River Telegraph Point - see wedding there Fanny Wallace Webber to Fred Downe (see PMN, 22 Mar 1905).
Mount Rockaree	North of Doyle's River in the Biriwal Bulga National Park. It is a significant landscape feature of the park.
Mount Seaview Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A mountain prominence on which Seaview Trig Station stands, about 9km SE of Brassey trig. station and about 17.7km NW of Yarras. Name Origin: was named by Lt. John Oxley when he came off the New England ranges and first saw the Pacific Ocean on 23 Sep 1818. At first it was known as Seaview Mount.
Mount Seaview State Forest	State forest in the forestry district of Taree with an area of 930 acres.
Mount Sinai Creek Gazetted: 14 Nov 1980	A watercourse about 3km long. It rises about 6km SW by W of Ellenborough and flows generally E into Ellenborough River.
Mount Stewart	Farm on Batai Boundary Road 5km W of Batai.

Mount Tirrandubundeba Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A mountain eminence on the Broken Bago Range about 5.5km SE of the village of Byabarra. Previous name Tirrandubundeba.
Mount Victoria	At Kindee - Carneys lived there in 1908.
Mount Wauch	The eastern bluff of Bago Bluff. Named for Captain Wauch.
Mount Werrikimbe Gazetted: 18 Jul 1982	A mount adjacent to the Hastings River. It is situated approx 1.2km ESE of Nothofagus Canyon, about 1.8km N of Cobcroft Cascades and 25km N of Mount Seaview.
Mountain View	Owned by Thomas Johns on Pipeclay Creek C.J. Blythe P.O. Huntingdon 1904. Farm at Swans Crossing area - on Tipperary Road.
Mowle Street	Port Macquarie. Named after Ernest Aubrey Mowle who was Mayor of Port Macquarie from 1936 to 1941.
Mrs Yorks Garden Gazetted: 5 Nov 1993	A reserve in Stewart Street, Port Macquarie. Origin: Bertha York arrived in Port Macquarie in the early 1960s. She was responsible for the planting of trees and shrubs at her own expense to assist in the beautification of this site overlooking Town Beach. Council erected a sign 'Mrs Yorks Garden' in recognition of her effort in 1968. She died in 1971. In 2014 the volunteer group 'Friends of Mrs Yorks garden' was established to rehabilitate the site.
Mud Bay Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A bay on the eastern side of Watson Taylors Lake about 4km SSW of Town of Laurieton.
Muddy Gully Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A watercourse rising about 5km SW of Allen Hill and which flows generally S into Balyngara Creek. Previous name Muddy Creek.
Mudfords Road	Johns River area. West of Middle Brother Mountain. Mudfords were a prominent family in the area.
Mulga Merrican	"At the head of the extensive Rollands Plains is another mountain bearing an aboriginal name of Mulga Merrican or "mountain of thunder"- so called due to the frequent thunderstorms which burst over this great range" Dick family story.
Mulhearns Mill	Timber mill located in the Forbes Valley near Birdswood operating in 1939. (see PMN, 10 Jun 1939, p7).
Mumfords Creek Gazetted: 10 Jun 1969	A perennial stream rising about 1.6km E of Mount Gibraltar. It flows generally NW for about 14.5km into the Ellenborough River at Kings Head.
Munanbung	Railway station – possibly near Pembroke (see PMN, 12 Jun 1920).

Munns Channel Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A channel starting at the junction of Balyngara Creek and Caswell Channel and flows generally NE then SE about 5km into the Hastings River. Previous name Ana Branch (Hastings River). The anabranch of the Hastings River which runs between Rawdon Island North and the mainland - previously named by Oxley as Laudon Channel - believed to be named after James Munn who owned land in the vicinity from 1839.
Munster Steet	Uncertain naming information. In 1831 Prince William Duke of Clarence was also the Earl of Munster, in Irish peerage. Munster is an ancient province of Ireland.
Murray Street	Port Macquarie. Named in 1831, Sir George Murray (1772-1846) was a British politician who was secretary of state for the colonies from May 1828 to November 1830.
Murrays Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A Partly perennial stream rising about 0.75km S of Kindee Trig Station. It flows generally east for about 8km into Pappinbarra River.
Murrin Murrin	Dairy and bee farm on the Wilson River Telegraph Point - owned by Mrs Rose E. Smith 1908.
Muscio Road	Sancrox. So named because it was the road leading to Wesley Muscio's property.
Muscio Rocks	Near Lilybank Wauchope - Muscio lived there.
Muston Hill	The hill on which Grantham was built Port Macquarie.
Muston Street	Port Macquarie. Named after Arthur Muston who mined red oxide in the area. The mines eventually closed in 1974. The red oxide was used for the purification of household gas.
Mutton Island	Mentioned by Mowle in "Old Port Macquarie".....-"In 1836 the population was 1300.... working at Rollands Plains Settlement Farm Redbank Prospect Mutton Island etc." *Early name for Koree Island.
Myall Creek Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A perennial stream rising about 7km SW of Mount Mickey Doran. It flows generally NE for about 8km into the Ellenborough River.
Myall Scrub Creek Road	See Mile Scrub.
Mybill	Farm between Rollands Plains road and Wilson River Ballengarra.
Myee Place	Port Macquarie. From the Aboriginal word meaning "fire". Part of the Kennedy Park Estate subdivision of 1979. (see PMN, 18 May 1979).

Myoora Place	Residence in Port Macquarie between Livingstone Road and Parsons Ridge Road. Aboriginal word meaning “restful place” (S.E. Endacott).
Myrtle Grove	Wauchope Historical Society: - “An original grant at Ellenborough probably to Major Innes - also the name of John Kirman’s land. The home was on the banks of the Ellenborough River upstream from the Oxley Highway. Home of John Hollis at Kindee 30 Apr 1913.
Myrtle Scrub	Village on the Oxley Highway 47km W of Yarras. Yarrowitch area - south of the Oxley Highway near Enfield State Forest junction with the Oxley Highway.
Myunah	Farm in the Huntingdon area west of Koree Island. Property in Huntingdon south of the Hastings River 6km W of Wauchope.
