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- Pacific Cottage** A cottage in Port Macquarie, on the corner of Owen and Burrawan Streets, home of Edward St Aubyn Kingsford (harbour pilot) in 1868 (see SMH, 24 Jan 1868).
- Paget Hall** Was a home on the corner of Horton and Clarence Streets Port Macquarie. The date of its build is disputed as descendants' contest it was built around 1824, while the Historical Society suggests the 1840s as Horton and Clarence Streets did not exist in 1824, and the half-acre site of the house was not granted to Morton until 1832. The house was demolished in 1937 to make way for Hatsatouris' theatre and shops (Ritz theatre) (see PMN, 21 Aug 1937, p.4). The home was built by Captain Thomas Paget Morton who had seen service in the Napoleonic wars (see Port Macquarie Express 18 Feb 1987). Mrs Atkinson ran a guest house there in 1907 (see SMH, 27 July 1907, p.7). Also known as Paget House.
- Pagets Hall** See Paget Hall
- Panorama Guest House** Located where the former Government House stood on the corner of Clarence and School Street. It was in operation in 1939, then called the Canberra Guest House (see PMN, 14 Jan 1939). The premise was modernised and by 1954 was known as the Panorama Guest House. (see The Wingham Chronicle and Manning River Observer, 21 May 1954). It is now the site of Focus Apartments. (See also Port Macquarie Former Government House Ruins conservation Management Plan, p.49).
- Pappinbarra**  
Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973 A parish (lands administrative division).
- Pappinbarra**  
Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973 A trig station about 5km SW by W of Mortons Creek village and about 2km E of Lower Pappinbarra locality.
- Pappinbarra**  
Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993 A village locality situated on the river of the same name, a tributary of the Hastings, 28km by road WNW of Wauchope. Supposedly Aboriginal name for 'clear water'. Also known as Bappin.
- Pappinbarra Creek** Originates in the area NW of Upper Pappinbarra runs SE into the Hastings River near Beechwood.

<b>Pappinbarra Junction</b> Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A rural locality at the junction of Pigeon Top Creek and Pappinbarra River, about 6km NE of Kindee trig. station.
<b>Pappinbarra Parade</b>	Port Macquarie. Named after the <i>SS Pappinbarra</i> that went ashore on the rocks off Port Stephens lighthouse in 1929. This ship was part of Nicholas Cain's Coastal Co-operative Steamship Company and worked between Port Macquarie and Sydney.
<b>Pappinbarra River</b> Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A perennial stream rising on the south eastern slopes of Mount Boss. It flows generally SE for about 48.2km into the Hastings River at Huntingdon. Previous name Pappinbarra Creek; Left Arm of Pappinbarra Creek.
<b>Pappinbarra State Forest</b> Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	State Forest in the Wauchope Forestry District. Area about 753h. Previous name Pappenbarra State Forest.
<b>Paradise</b>	Property of the Noakes family of Upper Rollands Plains. Used to be called Paradise Scrub.
<b>Parker Street</b>	(1) Port Macquarie. Named after William Skottowe Parker who was appointed Superintendent of Agriculture and Livestock in 1823 but was later compulsorily retired and replaced by his brother Henry. William Parker later settled in the area. Parker Street was not named until after 1936. (2) Wauchope. J. N. Parker landholder.
<b>Partridge Creek</b> Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A stream rising about 13km W by SW of Transit Hill. It flows generally NE by N for about 13km into Hastings River. Previous name Stoney Creek. Generally dry except in wet weather.
<b>Partridge Street</b>	Port Macquarie. Named after Stephen Partridge who was the first Superintendent of Convicts in Port Macquarie in 1821. He resigned to become the first licensed hotelkeeper in 1831, but later was again Superintendent of Convicts until 1836 when he then became a constable.
<b>Passionfruit Creek</b>	Located 11.2km S of Kew on the Pacific Highway.
<b>Passionfruit Gully</b> Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A partly perennial stream rising about 3km NE of village of Johns River. It flows generally ESE for about 2.5km into the Stewarts River. See Passionfruit Creek.

<b>Peach Grove</b>	An early name for Laurieton. Also Peach Orchard. “ <i>The first settlement was near several peach trees growing in an orchard on the river bank owned by two men who used to travel from Taree and camp and planted the peach trees. They used to harvest oysters and take them to Taree and send them to Sydney. This was situated where the present Dunbogan bridge now stands.</i> ” (Source: Cooper, Ray. Laurieton Leader [newspaper] 4 Nov 1987, p.6) (See also Bucton 'Tall Tales and True,' p.4).
<b>Peach Orchard</b>	Early name for Laurieton. See Peach Grove.
<b>Peachvale</b>	Farm off the North Branch road and Upsalls Creek – 10km W of Kendall.
<b>Pead Street</b>	Wauchope. Named after Daryl Pead a local mill owner.
<b>Peaked Hill</b>	Port Macquarie. A hill at one end of Shelly Beach. (Source 'An Historical Account of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependant Settlements' by James Wallis).
<b>Peaked Hill Point</b>	Mentioned in Oxley's journal: “ <i>Tacking Point was shut in by it.</i> ” See Also Peaked Hill.
<b>Pelican Bay</b> Gazetted: 18 Sep 1992	Area of waterway being part of Hastings River bounded on the east by Pelican Island and located south of Settlement Point. Origin: descriptive, a large flock of pelicans frequent this area on a year round basis and the area is located adjacent to Pelican Island. Previous name Back Channel.
<b>Pelican Island</b> Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	An island in the Hastings River about 2.5km WNW of Gaol Point which is North of Port Macquarie High School.
<b>Pelican Point</b> Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A point on the North Coast at the mouth of the Hastings River. It is about 1.5km NW of the Town of Port Macquarie. Previously named Penguin Point. (Source 'An Historical Account of the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependant Settlements' by James Wallis).
<b>Pembroke</b>	See Pembroke.
<b>Pembroke</b> Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A village locality about 7km NNE of Letterewe locality and about 4km NW of Hursley. Original name for Pembroke - a settlement on the Telegraph Point to Wauchope Road (Pembroke Road) 10km from Wauchope. It was named Pembroke by the Edwards brothers who owned land and named it after Pembroke in Wales. Name later changed to 'brooke' instead of 'broke' because it was more socially acceptable. Originally known as Stoney Creek. Local Indigenous name was <i>Monambang</i> .

<b>Pembroke Public School</b> Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A school on Kempsey Road, Wauchope.
<b>Pembroke Railway Station</b> Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A railway platform on the Sydney-Grafton- South Brisbane line. It is about 463km from Sydney.
<b>Penguin Point</b>	See Pelican Point.
<b>Penshurst Place</b>	Named after a stately English home built in the 14th century and once owned by Edward VI lately by Lord D'Lisle. Viscount William De L'Isle was the 15th Governor General of Australia from 1961-1965. He was the last British Governor General to hold office here.
<b>Peppers Store</b>	The store was located at Wauchope beside Jacaranda House in 1906 and run by Thomas Pepper. (see A short History of Wauchope, Vol.2, p.20).
<b>Peppermint Park</b>	A former theme park in Port Macquarie which opened in 1980 and closed in January 2003. The park was located on the corner of Ocean Street and Pacific Drive.
<b>Peronne</b>	Hastings Street Wauchope. Mrs Isabel Catherine Bourne died there 1964.
<b>Perpendicular Point</b> Gazetted: 29 May 1981	The terminal point of Camden Head, 1.5km ESE of the entrance to Camden Haven Inlet.
<b>Pettit Street</b>	Port Macquarie. Named after William Joseph Pettit, pilot and harbourmaster, 1829 to 1832.
<b>Pfeiffers Road</b>	Innes View. So named as it was the road leading to H. Pfeiffer's property.
<b>Phantassie</b>	Farm on the Lorne - Comboyne road 1km W of Lorne.
<b>Philip Charley Drive</b>	Port Macquarie. Named after Philip Charley whose family owned the land on which the crematorium is situated.
<b>Pie Mountain Creek</b> Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A watercourse about 5km long. It rises about 1km SW of Tinebank Mountain and flows generally SE then SE by S into the Wilson River.
<b>Pigeon Top</b> Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A minor trig station about 5.6km SE of Mount Boss and about 6.8km S of Banda Banda Trig Station.

<b>Pigeon Top Creek</b> Gazetted: 14 Feb 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 0.4km SE of Pigeon Top Trig. Station. It flows generally S for about 10km to its junction with Pappinbarra River at Pappinbarra Junction. Previous name Right Arm of Pappinbarra Creek.
<b>Pilot Beach</b> Gazetted: 23 Feb 1973	A beach west of Perpendicular Point about 4km ENE of Town of Laurieton. About 1km long, extending to the N.W. from Perpendicular Point to the Camden Haven Inlet.
<b>Pindari Parade</b>	Aboriginal name meaning "high ground."
<b>Pine Scrub Creek</b> Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A partly perennial stream rising about 3km S of Kindee trig. station. It flows generally SE for about 3km into Kindee Creek.
<b>Pines</b> Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A rural locality which lies about 2.5km NW of Brushy Mountain and 4 km NW by W of Rocky Peak on the Bellangry Road.
<b>Pioneer Park</b> Gazetted: 19 May 1995	A reserve located in Main Street, Comboyne, having an area of 7765sq.m. Origin: the name was chosen to commemorate the pioneers of the area. At its meeting on 10 Oct 1994, Council resolved to name the park officially.
<b>Pipeclay</b> Gazette: 16 Apr 1993	A locality about 3km N of Bagnoo and about 5 km SSW of Hollisdale. Previous name Pipe Clay.
<b>Pipeclay Bridge</b>	At Brombin (see H.S. Gazette 1953)
<b>Pipeclay Creek</b> Gazette: 29 Jun 1973	(1)A watercourse about 9km long. It rises about 2 km NE by E of Pipeclay and flows generally SE into the Hastings River. Previous name Pipe Clay Creek. Possibly named by Lieutenant Wilson after Captain Francis Allman's friend Captain John Piper - runs into the Maria River from the west south of Kundabung. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.46). (2) "Named on account of a peculiar disposition of a tribe of natives who were camped on the banks of the creek. These natives were friendly to explorers and on sighting their boats would cry out "Bacca" meaning tobacco. On the parties landing the natives entertained them by blowing on a reed and leaf flute which gave forth a rather musical sound similar to a pipe". (no source)
<b>Pipeclay Road</b>	Runs north of the Hastings River from Brombin Road.
<b>Pipers Creek</b>	Located at East Kempsey. (see PMN, 3 Oct 1894, p.6).
<b>Pirramurra</b>	Farm on the Batar Road 2km SW of Batar.

<b>Pitt Gully</b> Gazette: 14 Feb 1969	A non-perennial stream rising about 1.25km NE of the village of Toms Creek. It flows generally NNE for about 2km into Long Creek.
<b>Placid Trees</b>	Station in Tinebank parish (Marlo Merican)
<b>Plateau Beach Forest Reserve</b> Gazette: 30 Sep 1992	A reserve which lies 3400 metres N of Waterfall Forest Reserve and 8600 metres NW of Cameron's Bluff.
<b>Platt Street</b>	Port Macquarie. Runs off Ocean Drive. The Platt family were early pioneers of the Port Macquarie district.
<b>Playfords Road</b>	Comboyne. So named as it was the road leading to A. W. Playford's property.
<b>Pleasant Plains</b>	Lower Wilson River area. Alex Cochrane lived there in May 1889; James Swan in 1903.
<b>Plumtree Hill</b>	In the Yarrowitch area just north of the Oxley Highway in the Enfield State Forest.
<b>Point Allman</b>	Named after Captain Francis Allman.
<b>Point Elizabeth</b>	On the Hastings River west of Rawdon Island - mentioned by Phillip Parker King in his survey. "The surveyors landed at Point Elizabeth and walked through fine open country, well timbered... May 1819." (Source: Place of Banishment, p.40).
<b>Point George</b>	Named after Capt. Allman's 3 <sup>rd</sup> son born at Port Macquarie (see History of Port Macquarie, p.46).
<b>Point Perpendicular</b>	A short distance north of Camden Haven Head - the ss 'Telegraph' went aground there (see Manning River News, 19 Oct 1867)
<b>Point Plomer</b> Gazette: 6 Apr 1973	A headland about 4km S of Big Hill Point and about 4km NE of Saltwater Lake.
<b>Ponsfords Road</b>	Comboyne. So named because it was the road leading to G E Ponsford's property. The turn off is 3km W of Comboyne and runs north.
<b>Popanna</b>	Station 2km N of Ballengarra on the east side of the Rollands Plains Road on the banks of Bril Bril Creek.
<b>Port Macquarie</b> Gazette: 29 Jun 1973	An estuary at the mouth of the Hastings River to the Tasman Sea. It is situated on the north side of the town of Port Macquarie.

<b>Port Macquarie</b> Gazette: 11 Aug 2000	Town established at the mouth of the Hastings River. The site of the future settlement was named by explorer John Oxley in honour of then Governor of New South Wales Lachlan Macquarie 11 Oct 1818.
<b>Port Macquarie</b> Gazette: 6 Apr 1973	A trig. station on Transit Hill about 3km S of the town of Port Macquarie and 1.5km W of Miners Beach.
<b>Port Macquarie Dam</b> Gazette: 4 Dec 1987	A dam retaining waters in the Rosendahl Reservoir. Located about 3km S of Port Macquarie and 2km NW of Transit Hill. Previously the site was a dairy farm and egg hatchery.
<b>Port Macquarie General Cemetery</b> Gazette: 4 Dec 1987	A cemetery located on the Oxley Highway in Port Macquarie. Originally dedicated in 1863 it was officially closed to new burials in 1968.
<b>Port Macquarie Historic Cemetery</b> Gazette: 12 Feb 1988	A historic cemetery located on the east side Kooloonbung Creek, in Gordon Street, Port Macquarie. It was opened for burials in 1824 and closed in 1886.
<b>Port Macquarie Lions Lookout</b> Gazette: 20 May 1988	A lookout at Port Macquarie overlooking Town Beach. Located near the corner of Stewart Street and Lord Street. Previous name Lions Lookout.
<b>Port Macquarie Park</b> Gazette: 4 Dec 1987	A reserve bounded by William Street, Owen Street, Burrawan Street and Pacific Drive, Port Macquarie and about 200 metres west of Oxleys Beach.
<b>Port Macquarie Public School</b> Gazette: 29 Jun 1973	A school in William Street, Port Macquarie.
<b>Prince of Wales Hotel</b>	(1) Owned by Major A.C. Innes in the 1840s - situated at Balf Knob on Big Creek opposite "Glencoe" of Colonel Grey. Governor Fitzroy breakfasted there 8 Mar 1847. (2) Located at Huntingdon and owned by Richard Goodall.
<b>Prince of Wales Point</b>	A point on the Camden Haven Head near Pilot Beach where the steamer Prince of Wales struck a rock in 1862 and foundered.
<b>Private Hospital</b>	Building in Randall St. in 1915 was operated by Nurse Morris and was later owned by Bob Stone.

**Purves Street**

Stirling Green, Port Macquarie. William Purves (1811-1870), Presbyterian minister, was born on 26 July 1811 at Haddington, East Lothian, Scotland, son of William Purves, artificer. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Dunbar on 6 April 1836 and arrived at Sydney in 1839. Ordained by the Presbytery of Sydney on 14 December 1840, he was inducted minister at Port Macquarie, where he had the first church and manse built and ministered to settlers in the Hastings, Macleay and Manning Rivers districts.
