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Wabbra	Squattage of Betts and Panton on the Macleay river – 32,000 acres. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.117).
Waddys Farm	Rosewood (see PMN, 27 aug 1910 p.4).
Wade Park Gazetted: 5 Feb 1993	A public reserve located in Beechwood. Wade is an old name in the district.
Wade Street	Wauchope. Named for Monie and Flo Wade.
Wademont	Property of A. Wade at Mile Scrub near Rollands Plains August 1902.
Waitui Waterfall Gazetted: 26 Jun 1987	A waterfall on Stewarts River about 5km W by S of Dellward & about 8km NW of Hannam Vale and 12km SW of Lorne.
Walgett No. 1	Property 3km N of Kendall.
Walgett No. 2	Property 3km N of Kendall.
Walhalla	Farm on the Wauchope Comboyne Road near the junction of Jones Road - 3km E of Byabarra.
Walkers Creek Gazetted: 26 Jun 1987	A partly perennial stream rising 2km SSW of town of Herons Creek flows for about 3km towards Herons Creek. The lower course is indefinite in parts.
Walkham Vale	Farm on the Forbes River 3km NW of Birdwood.
Wall Reserve Gazetted: 9 Jan 1987	A reserve beside the training wall at North Haven about 1km NE of Ostler Park.
Wall Street	North Haven. The road leading to the break wall.
Wallaby Creek Road	Runs SE off The Scrub Road 6km W of Wauchope.

Wallaby Hill	"Wallaby Hill lies between Willsbro' and Glen Esk, about three miles from each". (see Empire 2nd March 1871, p.4). Original grant of Major Innes then to Rev. T. O'Reilly - Mr and Mrs Stewart – J.T.Guihen 13 May 1899. Situated 5km S of Rollands Plains between the Wilson River and Bril Bril Creek. The farm of E.C. Naylor Oct 1888-1895 - Panton owned it but leased it to E.C. Naylor 1883 -1895. 1100 acres grass 25 cattle 15 horses money from agistment. It once had a palatial home on it for Stewart Naylor and others - R. Henderson had it 23 Feb 1899. H. C. Henderson (see PMN, 25 Feb 1911) - to erect a cottage on his estate - may get married.
Wallace Estate	In the town of Wauchope - bought by Thomas Wallace from the Suters family.
Wallace Hill	C.M. Stewart sold it to T. Wilkes (see PMN, 1 May 1920).
Wallace Island Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	An island at the junction of Maria River and Hastings River, and on the left bank near Blackmans Point about 7km WNW of the town of Port Macquarie.
Wallace Reserve Gazetted: 27 Oct 1989	A reserve on the corner of Lady Penrhyn Court and Scarborough Way in the village of Dunbogan. Named after Mrs Grace Wallace a long time resident of the Dunbogan area. She moved to Dunbogan in 1927 and owned a large amount of land around the Boulevard. Passed away in 1968.
Wallace Road	Runs SW from Ellenborough. Constructed from Wauchope wharf to New England road in 1881, traces remain.
Wallace Street	Wauchope. Named after James Wallace who had purchased 40 acres of land from Thomas Suters and subdivided it to encourage the town to grow.
Wallibree Gazetted: 10 Jan 1969	A parish (lands administrative division).
Wallibree	Property on the Oxley Highway at the junction of Thone Creek and Hastings River near Bagnoo.
Wallighbrea	Township 45.1km W of Port Macquarie in 1840. About 27.6km from Major Innes Yarras.
Wallis Creek	In the Bulga State Forest area Ellenborough River.
Walmer	Freehold of Alexander Kennedy January 1859. Walmer is a town in Kent, England. Also an immigrant ship on the England to Australia run. Served also as a coastal trader.
Walters Road	Runs west off Rawdon Island Road towards Narrowgut.

Wambuyn Drive	Runs from Frogs Road overpass of Pacific Highway to Fernbank Creek Road roundabout near Cassegrains Winery. Aboriginal word for Kangaroo. Source:Lissarrague, A grammar and dictionary of Gathang (2010)
Wandalla	Farm on the Oxley Highway 1km W of Ellenborough.
Wandaville	Station on the west side of Gum Scrub Road 10km W of Cooperabung.
Wandella Drive	From wandellow bark stripped from trees used for making temporary huts and canoes, smaller ones for carrying vessels.
Wandoo Park	Station 5km W of Beechwood on the north side of Pappinbarra Road.
Warley	Property W of Kundabung on Smiths Creek Road 1km off the Pacific Highway.
Warlters Street	(1) Port Macquarie. Named after Jeremiah Walters who settled on land grants in the Hastings area around 1832. He is responsible for building Port Macquarie's first hotel. This street was originally part of Bay Street. (2) Wauchope. Prominent early family in Port Macquarie and Wauchope.
Warltersville	Property of Jeremiah Warlters 1920 acres on Wrights Creek - on the western side of Five Mile Creek - west of Port Macquarie.
Warrabee	Station on the western side of Gum Scrub Road 12km W of Cooperabung. School there in 27 May 1911.
Warraroong	Station in the Gum Scrub area E of the Wilson River.
Warrawilla	Farm west of the Maria River Road 10km SE of Kundabung. Farm North side of the Hastings River 1km E of Long Flat.
Warrell Creek	Kempsey - Macksville district. D.Cooper there in 1908.
Warrens Lane	Turn off about 8km from the Kendall-Comboyne Road.
Washtub Inlet	An inlet off the southern part of Watson Taylors Lake.
Waterfall Creek	Originates just NE of Comboyne running into Thone Creek near Byabarra.
Waterfall Forest Reserve Gazetted: 30 Sep 1992	A reserve which lies 3.4km N of Waterfall Forest Reserve and 8.6km NW of Camerons Bluff.
Waterhole Flat	Located at Gannon's Creek. John Murray was here in 1894. (see PMN, 3 Oct 1894, p.6).

Waterloo	Station between Yarras and Walcha.
Waterloo Creek Gazetted: 16 May 1973	A partly perennial stream rising about 6.5km NNW of Bonny Hills village. It flows generally south for about 4km into Queens Lake.
Waterloo Creek Road	In the Queens Lake State Forest west of Bonny Hills - joins Bobs Creek Road.
Waters Creek	In the Yarrowitch area north of the Oxley Highway near Brassy State Forest.
Waterview	Residence of Dr. Edwin Doudney the first medical officer appointed by the cottage hospital board in Port Macquarie in 1901. Corner of Clarence and Munster Streets. A palatial home in the early 1920s it became the Neville residence and they named it Waterview. (see PMN, Centenary Issue p.91 C4). Then became a guesthouse under Fenns then Chrystals then Miss Trahey. The Postal Institute bought it June 1972. It was demolished and a block of units built. Retained the name Waterview. Property of Mrs Lindsay then John Neville who married Anne Parker. <i>Source</i> "Letters from the Boer War"- Later occupied in the 1920s by William Carter. (See PMN, 6 Feb 1958) - Miss Violet Fenn aged 71 - with her late brother conducted Waterview Guest House before Miss Trahey purchased it.
Watonga Rocks	Rocks at Lighthouse beach Port Macquarie near the wreck of the ss. "Watonga".
Watonga Street	Port Macquarie. Named after the "SS Watonga" built in Scotland in 1876. Wrecked off Lighthouse Beach on 2nd January, 1882.
Watson Taylors Lake Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A perennial lake forming the S part of Camden Haven situated about 5km NE of the village of Johns River. Named by John Oxley in 1818 after the British politician George Watson Taylor (1771-1841).
Wattledene	(1) Property of the Harriott Brothers - 40 acres at Sarah's Creek 9 Dec 1899. (2) The night-soil depot Wauchope - near it at King Creek- (see PMN, 1 Mar 1913).
Wattleleigh	Property of Mr & Mrs Buckland Ellenborough 1913.
Wauch Gazetted: 22 Dec 1972	A trig station about 6km SSW of the town of Wauchope.

Wauch House	Original grant of Captain Robert Andrew Wauch who purchased 2297 acres (approximately 930 hectares) on Kings Creek and four years later bought an additional 1168 acres (approximately 473 Hectares). Following his death the Government Gazette published the deeds of his block which specified that the properties should be called Wauchope. This was the original form of the family name but the “ope” was eliminated by him after quarrels over the family estate. In 1881 the postal authorities opened a post office in the settlement and gave it the name of Wauchope even though the Government Gazette, because of a misprint, spelt it Wanghope. The error was not corrected until 1889.
Wauchope Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	Origin: It is said that Wauchope was named after Captain Wauch or Wauche, who came to NSW in 1836 and was given a grant of land which he named Wauchhope, to express future hopes of prosperity. (Reed, 1969). Name Origins: Captain Robert Andrew Wauch purchased 2,297 acres of land on King Creek and four years later he purchased an additional 1,168 acres. He called his property ‘Wauchope’ the original spelling of the family name. His father was Captain Robert Wauch (1761-1817) who was born on their family estate Niddrie Marischal near Edinburgh. The surname was originally Wauchope but when his father died there was a bitter dispute over inheritance. Losing the legal battle the Captain retired to his portion of the estate and dropped the ‘ope’ from his name. The name Wauch was passed on to his descendants including his son, Robert Andrew, the founder of Wauchope. (Source: Hastings Gazette n.d.). N.B. the Aboriginal name for the area around Wauchope is Yapun.yapun (<i>var.</i> yapon.yapon) Source:Lissarrague, A grammar and dictionary of Gathang (2010)
Wauchope Presbyterian Church	Located in High St. Wauchope. The foundation stone was laid 8 May 1915. (See People and Places, Vol.3, p.24).
Wauchope Railway Station Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A railway station on the Taree to Kempsey Line opened 12th April, 1915. (Source: People and Places, Vol.3, p.23).
Waugh Street	(1) Wauchope. Named after Capt. R.A. Wauch. (2) Port Macquarie.
Wayne Richards Park Gazetted: 9 Jan 2015	A sportsground reserve approximately 17.4 hectares Koala Street Port Macquarie. Origin: Named after Wayne Richards (24 May 1950-19 Aug 2003). Councillor of Port Macquarie Council between 1995 until his death in 2003. Wayne Richards was a supporter of youth and sport in the Hastings region and was instrumental in the formation of the Mayor's Sporting Fund - a fund that continues today.

Webb Street	Wauchope. Named after Mrs Thomas Wallace (nee Mary Webb Randle).
Wedlock	Farm Maria River State Forest area Parish Tinebank.
Weelah Native Reserve	Weelah Nature Reserve was created in October 1971. It covers an area of 37ha, and lies between Bulga and Ellenborough Falls.
Weismantel Street	Wauchope. Local family.
Weroona	Family home of William and Agnes Bransdon, William Street Port Macquarie.
Werrikimbe Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality containing both Werrikimbe National Park and Mount Boss State Forest. The Hastings River flows through the area. The locality of Mount Seaview adjoins to the south.
Wesley Avenue	The Wesley family came to Port Macquarie around about 1858. The son of an early settler, William and his wife Helen had a home and property with beautiful gardens in the vicinity of the street that was named after the family sometime in the 1950s.
West Haven Gazetted: 16 Apr 1993	A locality on the shore of an indentation in Queens Lake Entrance, about 2km NW of the town of Laurieton.
Westport	(1) Housing Commission homes in Bridge Street Port Macquarie - completed in Dec 1980. (2) Name given to the suburb of Port Macquarie immediately to the west.
Westport Park Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A reserve at Park Street and Buller Street, Port Macquarie. Previous name West Port Park.
Westport Public School Gazetted: 29 May 1981	A school, Widderson Street, Port Macquarie.
Wharf Road	Runs from the Pacific Highway on the north shore south to the Hastings river - to the west of the Dennis Bridge. This was possibly the wharf for the sugar mill in the vicinity in the 1870s.
Wharf Street	Wauchope - the road leading to the wharf.
White Bridge	Bridge on the Glebe Road (Old Lake Road) across scrubby swamp September 1888 - across the Kooloonbung Creek (see PMN, 8 Jul 1905).

White House	(1) Dwelling opposite the Post Office Port Macquarie on the corner of Horton and Clarence Streets. John Newell had a saddlery there 13 May 1899.1900. (2) A brick building near the Manning turn-off on the Oxley Highway Port Macquarie. Three quarters of a mile on the Port side of the Manning turn-off from the New England Highway. (3) T. G. Wilson Diary of 1 Sep 1967 P/101 - " <i>Took a walk around the paddocks (at Glenesk) with George and Henry-saw the White House remains where Mr. Gray used to live in the old times</i> ".
White Rose Cafe	Owned by Hatsaturis & Sons Horton St. Port Macquarie.
Whittings Grant	Fronting Sapling Creek or Ten Mile Creek 10 miles (16.1km) from Port Macquarie. (see Advertisement, PMN, 12 Apr 1902, p.3).
Widderson Street	Port Macquarie. Named after Thomas Widderson, a teamster who carried supplies to stations in the Walcha District.
Wild Cattle Creek	In the Bulga State Forest area.
Wildbull Park	Mt. Boss State Forest Upper Wilson River area - in Cobrabald Recreation area Parish of Tinebank.
Wildfels	Home of N.J. Lindsay Wauchope - built in 1907 by J. Baxter. In 1925 it was Dr Begg private hospital (see People and Places Vol.3, p.9 & p.10) and in 1977 it became the Catholic Presbytery.
Wildridge	Farm south of Pappinbarra Road Lower Pappinbarra region.
Willandra Place	Aboriginal name meaning "little waters - a creek."
Willaroo	Property and homestead at Rollands Plains
Willeree	Property on the Wilson River at Rollands Plains - In 1904 it was for sale. Homestead of 7 rooms, kitchen, barn, dairy orchard - 468 acres between Port Macquarie and Kempsey, 8.9km from the wharf. R.C. Cutler there - Jacob Healy bought it in 17 June 1905 for £3250.
Willesbro	Original grant of William Freeman and his cousin William Gorham 1 km N of Rollands Plains on the western side of Rollands Plains Road and the north side of Bril Bril Creek. George Irvine and William Scott had it till 1867 then sold it to T.G. Wilson. It had a horse powered treadmill from the early convict era used for sugar making. After the estate was sub-divided, the name, shortened to Willsbro, was attached to a property just to the east of the original estate. The name derives from a village in Kent, England where William was married. (see Estate names - Port Macquarie and District, Dawson, 2014).
Willi Willi	Station on the Upper Macleay River.

William Street	Port Macquarie - named after King William IV, English monarch, who reigned 1830-1837. In 1824 it was known as Oxley Street.
Willibee	Mentioned by Stanley Kennedy Birdwood - named on the 1846 maps. (see Hastings Shire Gazette, 10 Jun 1976).
Willow Glen	Station 1km S of Gum Scrub opposite Warraroong E of the Wilson River.
Willow Park	Farm east,of the Left Arm, Pappinbarra Road 3km from the junction.
Willows	Farm 4km S of Lorne.
Willsboro	See Willesbro
Willsbro	See Willesbro
Willunga	Station on the south side of the Wilson River 3km W of Telegraph Point off Farrawells Road.
Wilruna	Station near Gum Scrub on Bangalow Creek E of the Wilson River.
Wilson River Gazetted: 22 Nov 1968	A perennial stream rising about 0.75km SE of Rocky Peak Trig Station. It flows generally ESE for about 50km into the Maria River near Telegraph Point, 1km NW of Hacks Ferry. Name Origins: Named for Lieutenant William E. B. Wilson, Engineer and Inspector of Works with the first settlement. There are some early maps which have the name related to the river (Maria) which joins the Hastings River. Annabella Boswell also refers to the Wilson River as that which joined the Hastings River. (see PMN, 18 July 1994, p.11).
Wilson River Flora Reserve Gazetted: 21 Dec 2001	A reserve located about 5km S by SW of Marowin Mountain and about 8km E by SE of Mount Boss within Mount Boss State Forest.
Wilson River Sports Ground Gazetted: 20 May 1988	A reserve on the Pacific Highway, about 3km S of Telegraph Point (Locality).
Wilson Street	Port Macquarie. William Wilson arrived in Port Macquarie in 1823 and served as assistant superintendent of convicts to Captain Allman. In 1826 he was put in charge of the agricultural establishment at Rollands Plains. He became superintendent of convicts from 1830 till his death in 1836. He is buried in the Historic Cemetery.
Wilu	Farm at the eastern end of Sancrox village on the southern side.

Windmere	Property off the Oxley Highway just west of Port Macquarie.
Windmill Hill Gazetted: 4 Dec 1987	A reserve situated off Windmill Street and Pacific Drive, Port Macquarie. Originally granted to Major Innes. Named after the windmill built there by Innes. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.104).
Windmill Street	Port Macquarie runs off Pacific Drive - named after the windmill, built 1831/32 for crushing grain owned by Major Innes. The park on the headland opposite the street has a sculpture of parts of a windmill.
Windstead	Property E of the Pacific Highway on Pipers Creek 1km S of Kundabung.
Windy Ridge	Farm on the Forbes River 2km NW of Birdwood- on the Forbes River Road.
Winthorpe	Home of George Harriott Rawdon Island. (see PMN, 19 Feb 1921 & 7 Apr 1917).
Wirrabarra	Station on Clearfield – Dungay Creek Road 22km NW of Telegraph Point.
Wombeiong	Station in the Gum Scrub area 1km N of Gum Scrub village - just W of Gum Scrub Road.
Wonga Crescent	Port Macquarie. Wonga is an Aboriginal word for the native pigeon.
Wongabindi	Farm on Jones River.
Woodford Road	North Haven. Origins: Named after the Woodford family.
Woodgrove	Property and vineyard of Thomas and Catherine Platt on Old Lake Road near Fernhill Road in the industrial area Port Macquarie. Area named Sandy Flat in the 1860s.
Woodlands Park Gazetted: 17 Aug 2001	A reserve located adjacent to the Bellangry Road at Bellangry. Origin: Named in recognition of the Woodlands family, whose property adjoins the reserve. Originally part of Portion 54 granted to Robert Woodlands by Crown grant on 21 Oct 1921. Transferred to Department of Education in 1930 for a school site. Gazetted 20 Jun 1969 as Crown land for public recreation.
Woodlands Road	On Torrens Island NE of Telegraph Point.
Woodside	J.W. McIntyre's property on the North Shore Port Macquarie.
Wonders Hill	Farm on the Forbes River.

Woregore	Port Macquarie. Aboriginal name for the area Europeans named Settlement Point.
Wrights Creek Gazetted: 6 Apr 1973	A stream rising on the Eastern slopes of Transit Hill in Port Macquarie, it flows generally north for about 5km into Kooloonbung Creek and The Lake Swamp. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.55). Previously named Shoal Creek. (see History of Port Macquarie, p.32).
Wrights Lookout Gazetted: 29 Jun 1973	A lookout about 2.5km SSE of Croppys Hill, and 11km SWW of the town of Port Macquarie. Hill off the Pacific Highway west of Lake Innes 1km S of the junction of Oxley Highway and the Pacific Highway. Wright's Road leads past the Lookout into Lake Innes.
Wrights Road	Port Macquarie. Named after Captain Samuel Wright Commandant of the Port Macquarie penal settlement in 1826.
Wyandotte Ridge	Farm east of the railway Pembroke on Balyngarra Creek. Property on the eastern side of the railway line at Pembroke near the mouth of the Balyngarra Creek.
Wyandra Crescent	Name is the composite of the Christian names of the two original developers for the subdivision this street is situated in. The developers were William and Ray Lindeman. (<u>W</u> y for William <u>and</u> <u>ra</u> for Ray).
Wyoming	Home of William Dudley Nunn and his wife Mary (nee Blair) - on the Oxley Highway overlooking the racecourse at Port Macquarie 1889 (see PMN, 15 Mar 1902). J. L. Ruthven (The Earl of Gowrie) was there after his return from Sydney in 1906.
